Rebuild as a Verb

Definitions of "Rebuild" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “rebuild” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Build (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed.*
- *Build again.*



Synonyms of "Rebuild" as a verb (8 Words)

- reassemble** (of a group) gather together again.
*The trucks had to be **reassembled** on arrival.*
- reconstruct** Do over, as of (part of) a house.
*Later emperors **reconstructed** the army.*
- refashion** Make new.
*The industry reshaped and **refashioned** itself.*
- remake** Make new.
The bed would be more comfortable if it were remade.
- remodel** Do over, as of (part of) a house.
*She **remodelled** the head with careful fingers.*

renovate Give new life or energy to.
*My wife wants us to **renovate**.*

restore Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken.
***Restore** the forest to its original pristine condition.*

revamp To patch up or renovate; repair or restore.
*An attempt to **revamp** the museum's image.*



Usage Examples of "Rebuild" as a verb

- *After the earthquake people set about rebuilding their homes.*
- *We try to help them rebuild their lives.*
- *The house was rebuild after it was hit by a bomb.*



Associations of "Rebuild" (30 Words)

architect

A person who is responsible for inventing or realizing a particular idea or project.

*John was indisputably the **architect** of his own misfortune.*

architecture

The style in which a building is designed and constructed, especially with regard to a specific period, place, or culture.

***Architecture** and eloquence are mixed arts whose end is sometimes beauty and sometimes use.*

brick

Block or enclose with a wall of bricks.

*I had one of those Motorola **bricks** as my first cell phone.*

building

The occupants of a building.

*A picture of her standing amongst a **building** of rooks.*

<u>cabinet</u>	A piece of furniture resembling a cupboard with doors and shelves and drawers; for storage or display. <i>A cabinet meeting.</i>
construction	The arrangement of words according to syntactical rules. <i>She wore her hair in an amazing construction of whirls and ribbons.</i>
creativity	The use of imagination or original ideas to create something; inventiveness. <i>Firms are keen to encourage creativity.</i>
downsize	Reduce in size or number. <i>I downsized the rear wheel to 26 inches.</i>
fabricate	Concoct something artificial or untrue. <i>You will have to fabricate an exhaust system.</i>
ferroconcrete	Concrete reinforced with steel. <i>A ferroconcrete storage tank.</i>
forestry	Country covered by forests.
<u>forge</u>	A blacksmith's workshop; a smithy. <i>He forged ahead.</i>
<u>planting</u>	Putting seeds or young plants in the ground to grow. <i>He ordered the planting of policemen outside every doorway.</i>
privatize	Change from governmental to private control or ownership. <i>They were opposed to plans to privatize electricity and water.</i>
recast	Cast again, in a different role. <i>She had to recast her image to please the electorate in her home state.</i>
reconstitute	Construct or form anew or provide with a new structure. <i>The governing board was reconstituted.</i>
<u>reconstruct</u>	Reorganize (something). <i>Later emperors reconstructed the army.</i>
<u>reconstruction</u>	The action or process of reconstructing or being reconstructed. <i>A reconstruction of the accident would be staged to try to discover the cause of the tragedy.</i>
reestablish	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i>Reestablish peace in the region.</i>
reforestation	The process of replanting an area with trees. <i>The need for post fire reforestation.</i>
<u>refurbish</u>	Make brighter and prettier. <i>The premises have been completely refurbished in our corporate style.</i>

<u>reinstate</u>	Restore to the previous state or rank. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not reinstated.</i>
remodel	Shape (a figure or object) again or differently. <i>She remodelled the head with careful fingers.</i>
remold	Give new treads to (a tire).
reorganization	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>Many firms are facing massive reorganizations.</i>
reshape	Shape again or shape differently. <i>The decrees will thoroughly reshape Poland's economy.</i>
reshuffle	Interchange the positions of (members of a team, especially government ministers). <i>The president was forced to reshuffle his cabinet.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Restore law and order.</i>
<u>restructure</u>	Convert (the debt of a business in difficulty) into another kind of debt, typically one that is repayable at a later time. <i>A plan to strengthen and restructure the EC.</i>
seedling	A young plant, especially one raised from seed and not from a cutting.
