## Rebuild as a Verb

### Definitions of "Rebuild" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “rebuild” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Build (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed.*
- *Build again.*



## Synonyms of "Rebuild" as a verb (8 Words)

- reassemble** (of a group) gather together again.  
*The trucks had to be **reassembled** on arrival.*
- reconstruct** Do over, as of (part of) a house.  
*Later emperors **reconstructed** the army.*
- refashion** Make new.  
*The industry reshaped and **refashioned** itself.*
- remake** Make new.  
*The bed would be more comfortable if it were **remade**.*
- remodel** Do over, as of (part of) a house.  
*She **remodelled** the head with careful fingers.*

**renovate** Give new life or energy to.  
*My wife wants us to **renovate**.*

**restore** Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken.  
***Restore** the forest to its original pristine condition.*

**revamp** To patch up or renovate; repair or restore.  
*An attempt to **revamp** the museum s image.*



## Usage Examples of "Rebuild" as a verb

- *After the earthquake people set about rebuilding their homes.*
- *We try to help them rebuild their lives.*
- *The house was rebuild after it was hit by a bomb.*



## Associations of "Rebuild" (30 Words)

### architect

A person who is responsible for inventing or realizing a particular idea or project.

*John was indisputably the **architect** of his own misfortune.*

### architecture

The style in which a building is designed and constructed, especially with regard to a specific period, place, or culture.

***Architecture** and eloquence are mixed arts whose end is sometimes beauty and sometimes use.*

### **brick**

Block or enclose with a wall of bricks.

*I had one of those Motorola **bricks** as my first cell phone.*

### **building**

The occupants of a building.

*A picture of her standing amongst a **building** of rooks.*

<b><u>cabinet</u></b>	A piece of furniture resembling a cupboard with doors and shelves and drawers; for storage or display. <i>A <b>cabinet</b> meeting.</i>
<b>construction</b>	The arrangement of words according to syntactical rules. <i>She wore her hair in an amazing <b>construction</b> of whirls and ribbons.</i>
<b>creativity</b>	The use of imagination or original ideas to create something; inventiveness. <i>Firms are keen to encourage <b>creativity</b>.</i>
<b>downsize</b>	Reduce in size or number. <i>I <b>downsized</b> the rear wheel to 26 inches.</i>
<b>fabricate</b>	Concoct something artificial or untrue. <i>You will have to <b>fabricate</b> an exhaust system.</i>
<b>ferroconcrete</b>	Concrete reinforced with steel. <i>A <b>ferroconcrete</b> storage tank.</i>
<b>forestry</b>	Country covered by forests.
<b><u>forge</u></b>	A blacksmith's workshop; a smithy. <i>He <b>forged</b> ahead.</i>
<b><u>planting</u></b>	Putting seeds or young plants in the ground to grow. <i>He ordered the <b>planting</b> of policemen outside every doorway.</i>
<b>privatize</b>	Change from governmental to private control or ownership. <i>They were opposed to plans to <b>privatize</b> electricity and water.</i>
<b>recast</b>	Cast again, in a different role. <i>She had to <b>recast</b> her image to please the electorate in her home state.</i>
<b>reconstitute</b>	Construct or form anew or provide with a new structure. <i>The governing board was <b>reconstituted</b>.</i>
<b><u>reconstruct</u></b>	Reorganize (something). <i>Later emperors <b>reconstructed</b> the army.</i>
<b><u>reconstruction</u></b>	The action or process of reconstructing or being reconstructed. <i>A <b>reconstruction</b> of the accident would be staged to try to discover the cause of the tragedy.</i>
<b>reestablish</b>	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i><b>Reestablish</b> peace in the region.</i>
<b>reforestation</b>	The process of replanting an area with trees. <i>The need for post fire <b>reforestation</b>.</i>
<b><u>refurbish</u></b>	Make brighter and prettier. <i>The premises have been completely <b>refurbished</b> in our corporate style.</i>

<b><u>reinstate</u></b>	Restore to the previous state or rank. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not <b>reinstated</b>.</i>
<b>remodel</b>	Shape (a figure or object) again or differently. <i>She <b>remodelled</b> the head with careful fingers.</i>
<b>remold</b>	Give new treads to (a tire).
<b>reorganization</b>	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>Many firms are facing massive <b>reorganizations</b>.</i>
<b>reshape</b>	Shape again or shape differently. <i>The decrees will thoroughly <b>reshape</b> Poland's economy.</i>
<b>reshuffle</b>	Interchange the positions of (members of a team, especially government ministers). <i>The president was forced to <b>reshuffle</b> his cabinet.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i><b>Restore</b> law and order.</i>
<b><u>restructure</u></b>	Convert (the debt of a business in difficulty) into another kind of debt, typically one that is repayable at a later time. <i>A plan to strengthen and <b>restructure</b> the EC.</i>
<b>seedling</b>	A young plant, especially one raised from seed and not from a cutting.
