- *The action of receiving something or the fact of its being received.*

<b>cooking directions</b>	The act of preparing something (as food) by the application of heat.
<b>earnings</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>He claimed damages for loss of <b>earnings</b>.</i>
<b>gaining</b>	The advantageous quality of being beneficial.
<b>getting</b>	The act of acquiring something. <i>He s much more interested in the <b>getting</b> than in the giving.</i>
<b>income</b>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>Figures showed an overall increase in <b>income</b> this year.</i>
<b>money received</b>	The most common medium of exchange; functions as legal tender.

<b>proof of purchase</b>	A trial photographic print from a negative.
<b>reception</b>	(American football) the act of catching a pass in football. <i>The tight end made a great <b>reception</b> on the 20 yard line.</i>
<u><b>revenue</b></u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>Traders have lost 10 000 in <b>revenue</b> since the traffic scheme was implemented.</i>
<b>sales slip</b>	Income (at invoice values) received for goods and services over some given period of time.
<b>sales ticket</b>	Income (at invoice values) received for goods and services over some given period of time.
<b>takings</b>	The income or profit arising from such transactions as the sale of land or other property.
<b>till receipt</b>	Unstratified soil deposited by a glacier; consists of sand and clay and gravel and boulders mixed together.
<b>turnover</b>	The act of upsetting something. <i>The team were sitting on their lead and taking care to avoid <b>turnovers</b>.</i>

- Always make sure you get a receipt.
- She had the receipts, and showed Rachel texts he had sent her.
- Box office receipts.
- I would be grateful if you would acknowledge receipt of this letter.
- Families in receipt of supplementary benefit.

## Associations of "Receipt" (30 Words)

<b>account</b>	To give an account or representation of in words. <i>In order that he may be able to <b>account</b> accurately the trustee should not mingle the trust property with other property.</i>
<b>annuitant</b>	A person who receives an annuity.
<b>appropriation</b>	The action of appropriating something. <i>The necessary funds were obtained by the government s <b>appropriation</b> of the company s operating unit.</i>
<b>bill</b>	A poster or handbill. <i>He had been <b>billed</b> 3 000 for his licence.</i>
<b><u>billing</u></b>	The fact of being advertised or described in a particular way. <i>The account was worth about 2 million a year in <b>billings</b>.</i>
<b>bookkeeper</b>	Someone who records the transactions of a business. <i>The business had grown enough to justify hiring a <b>bookkeeper</b>.</i>

<b>budgetary</b>	Relating to or in accordance with an estimate of income and expenditure. <i>A coalition to prevent <b>budgetary</b> cuts to schools.</i>
<b>carousal</b>	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
<b>cash</b>	Exchange for cash. <i>A discount for <b>cash</b>.</i>
<b>consumer</b>	A person who purchases goods and services for personal use. <i>Understanding what motivates <b>consumers</b> is more crucial than ever.</i>
<b>cost</b>	Cause the loss or unpleasant consequence of. <i><b>Costs</b> may be awarded to a successful private prosecutor out of central funds.</i>
<b>counter</b>	A device used for counting. <i>A <b>counter</b> may be used to stiffen the material around the heel and to give support to the foot.</i>
<b>cutback</b>	A reduction in quantity or rate. <i><b>Cutbacks</b> in defence spending.</i>
<b>deposit</b>	Matter that has been deposited by some natural process. <i><b>Deposit</b> the suitcase on the bench.</i>
<b>disbursement</b>	A payment, especially one made by a solicitor to a third party and then claimed back from the client. <i>The bill includes unpaid professional <b>disbursements</b>.</i>
<b>documentation</b>	Program listings or technical manuals describing the operation and use of programs. <i>She arranged the collection and <b>documentation</b> of photographs.</i>
<b>expenditure</b>	The act of spending money for goods or services. <i>The <b>expenditure</b> of taxpayers money.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Charge something to an expense account. <i>He kept a careful record of his <b>expenses</b> at the meeting.</i>
<b>fund</b>	Provide a fund for the redemption of principal or payment of interest. <i>A concert to raise <b>funds</b> for the church.</i>
<b>funds</b>	Assets in the form of money.
<b>invoice</b>	Send an invoice for goods or services provided. <i>She <b>invoiced</b> the company for her expenses.</i>
<b>outlay</b>	Money paid out; an amount spent. <i>Comparatively little financial <b>outlay</b>.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).

<b>reception</b>	The act of receiving. <i>The tight end made a great <b>reception</b> on the 20 yard line.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b>spending</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money.
<b>spree</b>	Take part in a spree. <i>Crews were seldom going ashore and therefore seldom going on the <b>spree</b>.</i>
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>It should be financed out of <b>taxation</b>.</i>
<b>wasting</b>	A decrease in size of an organ caused by disease or disuse. <i>A <b>wasting</b> disease.</i>
