- The act of becoming more distant.
- A period of temporary economic decline during which trade and industrial activity are reduced, generally identified by a fall in GDP in two successive quarters.
- The state of the economy declines; a widespread decline in the GDP and employment and trade lasting from six months to a year.
- The withdrawal of the clergy and choir from the chancel to the vestry at the end of a church service.
