Associations of "Recidivism" (30 Words)

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| all | To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>All parties are welcome.</i> |
| always | Throughout a long period of the past. <i>The sun always rises in the east.</i> |
| amplitude | The angular distance of a celestial object from the true east or west point of the horizon at rising or setting. <i>The amplitude of alpha rhythms.</i> |
| dabble | Dip a foot or hand briefly into a liquid. <i>She dabbles in astronomy.</i> |
| ever | At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>They felt better than ever before.</i> |
| frequency | The ratio of the number of observations in a statistical category to the total number of observations. <i>A coding sequence to ensure that everyone changes frequency in the correct manner.</i> |
| frequent | Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. <i>A frequent or common error is using the transitive verb lay for the intransitive lie.</i> |
| frequently | Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i> |
| incidence | The intersection of a line, or something moving in a straight line, such as a beam of light, with a surface. <i>He measured the angle of incidence of the reflected light.</i> |
| infrequently | Not often; rarely. <i>He cooks but only infrequently.</i> |
| intermittently | In an intermittent manner. <i>He has worked intermittently in a variety of jobs.</i> |

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| <u>invariably</u> | Without variation or change, in every case. <i>Ranch meals are invariably big and hearty.</i> |
| modulated | Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume. |
| occasional | Recurring or reappearing from time to time. <i>An occasional table.</i> |
| <u>occasionally</u> | Now and then or here and there. <i>He was arrogant and occasionally callous.</i> |
| offender | A person who commits an illegal act. <i>You can't get away from sex these days and the TV is the worst offender.</i> |
| oft | Many times at short intervals. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i> |
| often | In many cases or instances. <i>He often goes for long walks by himself.</i> |
| oftentimes | Frequently; many times. <i>I would oftentimes go there.</i> |
| <u>proportional</u> | One of the quantities in a mathematical proportion. <i>The punishment ought to be proportional to the crime.</i> |
| <u>quite</u> | To the utmost or most absolute extent or degree; absolutely; completely. <i>Quite tasty.</i> |
| <u>rare</u> | (of an event, situation, or condition) not occurring very often. <i>Total eclipses are rare events.</i> |
| <u>rarely</u> | To an unusual degree; exceptionally. <i>We rarely met.</i> |
| rareness | Noteworthy scarcity. |
| rife | Excessively abundant. <i>The streets were rife with rumour and fear.</i> |
| <u>sometimes</u> | Occasionally, rather than all of the time. <i>Sometimes I want to do things on my own.</i> |
| <u>sparse</u> | Thinly dispersed or scattered. <i>Areas of sparse population.</i> |
| sporadically | Occasionally or at irregular intervals. <i>The comedy is only sporadically funny.</i> |
| successively | Immediately one after another. <i>Three letters of successively decreasing length.</i> |
| usually | Under normal conditions; generally. <i>Heat resistant paints are usually black or aluminium coloured.</i> |
