- *An expression or function so related to another that their product is unity; the quantity obtained by dividing the number one by a given quantity.*
- *Hybridization involving a pair of crosses that reverse the sexes associated with each genotype.*
- *One of a pair of numbers whose product is 1: the reciprocal of  $\frac{2}{3}$  is  $\frac{3}{2}$ ; the multiplicative inverse of 7 is  $\frac{1}{7}$ .*

- (mathematics) one of a pair of numbers whose product is 1: the reciprocal of  $\frac{2}{3}$  is  $\frac{3}{2}$ ; the multiplicative inverse of 7 is  $\frac{1}{7}$ .

- *(of an agreement or obligation) bearing on or binding each of two parties equally.*
- *(of a pronoun or verb) expressing mutual action or relationship.*
- *(of a course or bearing) differing from a given course or bearing by 180 degrees.*
- *(of a quantity or function) related to another so that their product is unity.*
- *Of or relating to the multiplicative inverse of a quantity or function.*
- *Given, felt, or done in return.*
- *Concerning each of two or more persons or things; especially given or done in return.*

## Associations of "Reciprocal" (30 Words)

<b><u>affiliated</u></b>	(of a subsidiary group or a person) officially attached or connected to an organization. <i><b>Affiliated</b> clubs.</i>
<b>bilateral</b>	Affecting or undertaken by two parties. <i><b>Bilateral</b> hearing is essential for sound location.</i>
<b>both</b>	Used before the first of two alternatives to emphasize that the statement being made applies to each (the other alternative being introduced by 'and'). <i>Studies of zebra finches <b>both</b> in the wild and in captivity.</i>
<b><u>communal</u></b>	For or by a group rather than individuals. <i><b>Communal</b> pride in impressive local buildings.</i>
<b><u>complementary</u></b>	Relating to complementary medicine. <i>They had different but <b>complementary</b> skills.</i>
<b>congruity</b>	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
<b>connection</b>	The placing of parts of an electric circuit in contact so that a current may flow. <i>There was a <b>connection</b> between eating that pickle and having that nightmare.</i>
<b><u>converse</u></b>	Conversation. <i>His <b>converse</b> at such seasons was always elevating.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	Joint operation or action. <i>They worked in close <b>cooperation</b> with the British Tourist Authority.</i>
<b>cordiality</b>	A cordial disposition.
<b>correlative</b>	Mutually related. <i>The child's right to education is a <b>correlative</b> of the parent's duty to send the child to school.</i>
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>Old ties of love and <b>friendship</b>.</i>

<b>inherence</b>	The state of inhering; the state of being a fixed characteristic. <i>The <b>inherence</b> of polysemy in human language.</i>
<b>interaction</b>	A mutual or reciprocal action; interacting. <i>For a shy person social <b>interaction</b> can be a stomach churning anxiety filled experience.</i>
<b>interactive</b>	Allowing a two-way flow of information between a computer and a computer-user; responding to a user's input. <i>Fully sighted children in <b>interactive</b> play with others with defective vision.</i>
<b>interconnect</b>	Be interwoven or interconnected. <i>The lakes are <b>interconnected</b> by trails filled with joggers.</i>
<b>joint</b>	Cut the body of an animal into joints for cooking. <i>A <b>joint</b> statement.</i>
<b>learning</b>	A thing learned by experience; a lesson. <i>I liked to parade my <b>learning</b> in front of my sisters.</i>
<a href="#">link</a>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>It turns out he reads my blogs and was very pleased I d <b>linked</b> to his article.</i>
<b>multilateral</b>	Having many parts or sides. <i><b>Multilateral</b> negotiations.</i>
<a href="#">mutual</a>	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>Scottish Amicable may switch from <b>mutual</b> to plc status.</i>
<b>mutuality</b>	The sharing of a feeling, action, or relationship between two or more parties. <i>The <b>mutuality</b> of their affection was obvious.</i>
<b>rapport</b>	A close and harmonious relationship in which the people or groups concerned understand each other's feelings or ideas and communicate well. <i>There was little <b>rapport</b> between them.</i>
<a href="#">reciprocity</a>	A relation of mutual dependence or action or influence. <i>The Community intends to start discussions on <b>reciprocity</b> with third countries.</i>
<b>related</b>	Associated with the specified item or process, especially causally. <i>Sleeping sickness and <b>related</b> diseases.</i>
<b>relation</b>	An abstraction belonging to or characteristic of two entities or parts together. <i>International <b>relations</b>.</i>

<b><u>socialization</u></b>	The process of learning to behave in a way that is acceptable to society. <i>Pre school starts the process of <b>socialization</b>.</i>
<b>together</b>	With or in proximity to another person or people. <i>We worked <b>together</b> on the project.</i>
<b>tripartite</b>	Consisting of three parts. <i>A <b>tripartite</b> classification.</i>
<b>trust</b>	A body of trustees. <i>I used only primary sources taking nothing on <b>trust</b>.</i>
