According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "recite" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Specify individually.
- Render verbally.
- Say aloud (a series of names, facts, etc.
- Repeat aloud or declaim (a poem or passage) from memory before an audience.
- Recite in elocution.
- Render verbally.
- Narrate or give a detailed account of.
- Repeat aloud from memory.





Synonyms of "Recite" as a verb (22 Words)

declaim Recite in elocution.

A preacher **declaim**ing from the pulpit.

deliver Bring to a destination make a delivery.

Deliver us from the nightmare of junk mail.

detail Provide details for.

The ambulances were **detail**ed to the fire station.

enumerate Specify individually.

There is not space to **enumerate** all his works.

give a recitation Endure the loss of. **itemise** Specify individually.

Present as a list of individual items.

An **itemize**d bill.



list Enlist for military service.

Local offices are **list**ed in the phone book.

Narrate or give a detailed account of.

The series is **narrate**d by Richard Baker.

perform Carry out or perform an action.

We performed a popular Gilbert and Sullivan opera.

Put quote marks around.

He **quote**d the Bible to her.

rattle off Shake and cause to make a rattling noise.

read aloud Obtain data from magnetic tapes.

Tell someone about something; give an account of an event or

recount experience.

I **recount**ed the tale to Steve.

reel off Wind onto or off a reel.

render

To surrender someone or something to another.

The fat was being out up and rendered for lard

The fat was being cut up and **render**ed for lard.

repeat from memory To say, state, or perform again.

retell Tell (a story) again or differently.

Walker **retell**s the history of the world from the black perspective.

say a poem Have or contain a certain wording or form.

say aloud Indicate.

speak (of a hound) bark.

The prisoner won t **speak**.

Narrate or give a detailed account of.

He tried to make the children laugh by **tell**ing jokes.







Usage Examples of "Recite" as a verb

- Recite a poem.
- He recited passages of Dante.
- She recited the dates and names of kings and queens.
- The doctor recited the list of possible side effects of the drug.
- She recited a poem.
- The pupil recited his lesson for the day.

invocation A prayer asking God's help as part of a religious service.

His **invocation** of the ancient powers of Callanish.

itemize Place on a list of items.

I have **itemize**d the morning s tasks.

Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or

learn other effort.

The trading standards office **learn**ed of the illegal network.

A litany contained in the Book of Common Prayer.

A **litany** of failures.

memorize

Commit to memory; learn by heart.

He **memorize**d thousands of verses.

monologue Speech you make to yourself.

Fred carried on with his **monologue** as if I hadn t spoken.

Narrate or give a detailed account of.

The story is **narrate**d by the heroine.

Talk pompously.

Lend me your ears Fred **orate**d.

A piece of writing in which the expression of feelings and ideas is given

verbalize Express (ideas or feelings) in words, especially by speaking out loud.

Many English nouns have become **verbalize**d.
