### Definitions of "Recite" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “recite” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Specify individually.*
- *Render verbally.*
- *Say aloud (a series of names, facts, etc).*
- *Repeat aloud or declaim (a poem or passage) from memory before an audience.*
- *Recite in elocution.*
- *Render verbally.*
- *Narrate or give a detailed account of.*
- *Repeat aloud from memory.*



## Synonyms of "Recite" as a verb (22 Words)

<b>declaim</b>	Recite in elocution. <i>A preacher <b>declaiming</b> from the pulpit.</i>
<b>deliver</b>	Bring to a destination make a delivery. <i><b>Deliver</b> us from the nightmare of junk mail.</i>
<b>detail</b>	Provide details for. <i>The ambulances were <b>detailed</b> to the fire station.</i>
<b>enumerate</b>	Specify individually. <i>There is not space to <b>enumerate</b> all his works.</i>
<b>give a recitation</b>	Endure the loss of.
<b>itemise</b>	Specify individually.
<b>itemize</b>	Present as a list of individual items. <i>An <b>itemized</b> bill.</i>

<b>list</b>	Enlist for military service. <i>Local offices are <b>listed</b> in the phone book.</i>
<b><u>narrate</u></b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The series is <b>narrated</b> by Richard Baker.</i>
<b>perform</b>	Carry out or perform an action. <i>We <b>performed</b> a popular Gilbert and Sullivan opera.</i>
<b><u>quote</u></b>	Put quote marks around. <i>He <b>quoted</b> the Bible to her.</i>
<b>rattle off</b>	Shake and cause to make a rattling noise.
<b>read aloud</b>	Obtain data from magnetic tapes.
<b><u>recount</u></b>	Tell someone about something; give an account of an event or experience. <i>I <b>recounted</b> the tale to Steve.</i>
<b>reel off</b>	Wind onto or off a reel.
<b>render</b>	To surrender someone or something to another. <i>The fat was being cut up and <b>rendered</b> for lard.</i>
<b>repeat from memory</b>	To say, state, or perform again.
<b>retell</b>	Tell (a story) again or differently. <i>Walker <b>retells</b> the history of the world from the black perspective.</i>
<b>say a poem</b>	Have or contain a certain wording or form.
<b>say aloud</b>	Indicate.
<b>speak</b>	(of a hound) bark. <i>The prisoner won't <b>speak</b>.</i>
<b>tell</b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>He tried to make the children laugh by <b>telling</b> jokes.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Recite" as a verb

- *Recite a poem.*
- *He recited passages of Dante.*
- *She recited the dates and names of kings and queens.*
- *The doctor recited the list of possible side effects of the drug.*
- *She recited a poem.*
- *The pupil recited his lesson for the day.*



## Associations of "Recite" (30 Words)

- aloud** Using the voice; not silently.  
*He wept **aloud**.*
- antiphon** A musical setting of an antiphon.

<b>articulate</b>	Having joints or jointed segments. <i>The ankle bone <b>articulates</b> with the leg bones to form the ankle bones.</i>
<b>breviary</b>	A book containing the service for each day, to be recited by those in orders in the Roman Catholic Church.
<b>eloquently</b>	In an articulate manner. <i>He expressed his ideas <b>eloquently</b>.</i>
<b>enunciate</b>	Express or state clearly. <i>She <b>enunciated</b> each word slowly.</i>
<b>hymn</b>	Praise by singing a hymn. <i>The traditional Easter <b>hymn</b> of rejoicing.</i>
<b>incantation</b>	A series of words said as a magic spell or charm. <i>There was no magic in such <b>incantation</b>.</i>
<b>invocation</b>	A prayer asking God's help as part of a religious service. <i>His <b>invocation</b> of the ancient powers of Callanish.</i>
<b>itemize</b>	Place on a list of items. <i>I have <b>itemized</b> the morning s tasks.</i>
<b>learn</b>	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>The trading standards office <b>learned</b> of the illegal network.</i>
<b>litany</b>	A litany contained in the Book of Common Prayer. <i>A <b>litany</b> of failures.</i>
<b>memorize</b>	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>He <b>memorized</b> thousands of verses.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	Speech you make to yourself. <i>Fred carried on with his <b>monologue</b> as if I hadn t spoken.</i>
<b>narrate</b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is <b>narrated</b> by the heroine.</i>
<b>orate</b>	Talk pompously. <i>Lend me your ears Fred <b>orated</b>.</i>
<b>poem</b>	A piece of writing in which the expression of feelings and ideas is given intensity by particular attention to diction (sometimes involving rhyme), rhythm, and imagery. <i>The sun is an important symbol in this <b>poem</b>.</i>
<b>pronounce</b>	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>Allow history to <b>pronounce</b> the verdict.</i>
<b>read</b>	Having a specified level of knowledge as a result of reading. <i>Now I know what my reputation is I <b>read</b> the papers.</i>

<b>recitation</b>	Systematic training by multiple repetitions. <i>The history of an organization is more important than the <b>recitation</b> of details like this.</i>
<b>recount</b>	Count again. <i>He <b>recounts</b> how they often talked of politics.</i>
<b>rote</b>	Memorization by repetition. <i><b>Rote</b> learning.</i>
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>My mother had a beautiful <b>singing</b> voice.</i>
<b>soliloquy</b>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>He did most of his thinking by <b>soliloquy</b>.</i>
<b>spell</b>	Place under a spell. <i>A <b>spell</b> of good weather.</i>
<b>supplication</b>	The action of asking or begging for something earnestly or humbly. <i>He fell to his knees in <b>supplication</b>.</i>
<b>talking</b>	The action of talking speech or discussion. <i>I ll do the <b>talking</b> you just back me up.</i>
<b>tell</b>	Divulge confidential or private information. <i>He could <b>tell</b> that she was unhappy.</i>
<b>utter</b>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>Charlotte stared at her in <b>utter</b> amazement.</i>
<b>verbalize</b>	Express (ideas or feelings) in words, especially by speaking out loud. <i>Many English nouns have become <b>verbalized</b>.</i>
