Recite as a Verb

Definitions of "Recite" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “recite” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Specify individually.*
- *Render verbally.*
- *Say aloud (a series of names, facts, etc).*
- *Repeat aloud or declaim (a poem or passage) from memory before an audience.*
- *Recite in elocution.*
- *Render verbally.*
- *Narrate or give a detailed account of.*
- *Repeat aloud from memory.*



Synonyms of "Recite" as a verb (22 Words)

declaim	Recite in elocution. <i>A preacher declaiming from the pulpit.</i>
deliver	Bring to a destination make a delivery. <i>Deliver us from the nightmare of junk mail.</i>
detail	Provide details for. <i>The ambulances were detailed to the fire station.</i>
enumerate	Specify individually. <i>There is not space to enumerate all his works.</i>
give a recitation	Endure the loss of.
itemise	Specify individually.
itemize	Present as a list of individual items. <i>An itemized bill.</i>

list	Enlist for military service. <i>Local offices are listed in the phone book.</i>
<u>narrate</u>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The series is narrated by Richard Baker.</i>
perform	Carry out or perform an action. <i>We performed a popular Gilbert and Sullivan opera.</i>
<u>quote</u>	Put quote marks around. <i>He quoted the Bible to her.</i>
rattle off	Shake and cause to make a rattling noise.
read aloud	Obtain data from magnetic tapes.
<u>recount</u>	Tell someone about something; give an account of an event or experience. <i>I recounted the tale to Steve.</i>
reel off	Wind onto or off a reel.
render	To surrender someone or something to another. <i>The fat was being cut up and rendered for lard.</i>
repeat from memory	To say, state, or perform again.
retell	Tell (a story) again or differently. <i>Walker retells the history of the world from the black perspective.</i>
say a poem	Have or contain a certain wording or form.
say aloud	Indicate.
speak	(of a hound) bark. <i>The prisoner won't speak.</i>
tell	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>He tried to make the children laugh by telling jokes.</i>



Usage Examples of "Recite" as a verb

- *Recite a poem.*
- *He recited passages of Dante.*
- *She recited the dates and names of kings and queens.*
- *The doctor recited the list of possible side effects of the drug.*
- *She recited a poem.*
- *The pupil recited his lesson for the day.*



Associations of "Recite" (30 Words)

- aloud** Using the voice; not silently.
*He wept **aloud**.*
- antiphon** A musical setting of an antiphon.

articulate	Having joints or jointed segments. <i>The ankle bone articulates with the leg bones to form the ankle bones.</i>
breviary	A book containing the service for each day, to be recited by those in orders in the Roman Catholic Church.
eloquently	In an articulate manner. <i>He expressed his ideas eloquently.</i>
enunciate	Express or state clearly. <i>She enunciated each word slowly.</i>
hymn	Praise by singing a hymn. <i>The traditional Easter hymn of rejoicing.</i>
incantation	A series of words said as a magic spell or charm. <i>There was no magic in such incantation.</i>
invocation	A prayer asking God's help as part of a religious service. <i>His invocation of the ancient powers of Callanish.</i>
itemize	Place on a list of items. <i>I have itemized the morning s tasks.</i>
learn	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>The trading standards office learned of the illegal network.</i>
litany	A litany contained in the Book of Common Prayer. <i>A litany of failures.</i>
memorize	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>He memorized thousands of verses.</i>
monologue	Speech you make to yourself. <i>Fred carried on with his monologue as if I hadn t spoken.</i>
narrate	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is narrated by the heroine.</i>
orate	Talk pompously. <i>Lend me your ears Fred orated.</i>
poem	A piece of writing in which the expression of feelings and ideas is given intensity by particular attention to diction (sometimes involving rhyme), rhythm, and imagery. <i>The sun is an important symbol in this poem.</i>
pronounce	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>Allow history to pronounce the verdict.</i>
read	Having a specified level of knowledge as a result of reading. <i>Now I know what my reputation is I read the papers.</i>

recitation	Systematic training by multiple repetitions. <i>The history of an organization is more important than the recitation of details like this.</i>
recount	Count again. <i>He recounts how they often talked of politics.</i>
rote	Memorization by repetition. <i>Rote learning.</i>
singing	The act of singing vocal music. <i>My mother had a beautiful singing voice.</i>
soliloquy	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>He did most of his thinking by soliloquy.</i>
spell	Place under a spell. <i>A spell of good weather.</i>
supplication	The action of asking or begging for something earnestly or humbly. <i>He fell to his knees in supplication.</i>
talking	The action of talking speech or discussion. <i>I ll do the talking you just back me up.</i>
tell	Divulge confidential or private information. <i>He could tell that she was unhappy.</i>
utter	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>Charlotte stared at her in utter amazement.</i>
verbalize	Express (ideas or feelings) in words, especially by speaking out loud. <i>Many English nouns have become verbalized.</i>
