<u>careless</u>	(of an action or its result) showing or caused by a lack of attention. <i>He admitted careless</i> driving.
<u>daredevil</u>	Reckless and daring. A daredevil test pilot having the right stuff.
foolhardy	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences-Macaulay. Foolhardy enough to try to seize the gun from the hijacker.
hasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation. <i>Rejected what was regarded as an over</i> hasty <i>plan for reconversion.</i>
heady	(of alcoholic drink) potent; intoxicating. The heady days of my youth.



heedless	Characterized by careless unconcern- Edith Wharton. The heedless generosity and the spasmodic extravagance of persons used to large fortunes.
<u>impetuous</u>	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation. An impetuous display of spending and gambling.
impulsive	Acting or done without forethought. <i>He regretted his impulsive offer.</i>
inattentive	Showing a lack of attention or care. An inattentive babysitter.
incautious	(of a person or an action) heedless of potential problems or risks. <i>He blames incautious borrowing during the boom.</i>
overhasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Hard times are showing up overhasty mergers.</i>
<u>precipitate</u>	Occurring suddenly or abruptly. I must apologize for my staff their actions were precipitate .
precipitous	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>The precipitous</i> rapids of the upper river.
rash	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences-Macaulay. Do something rash that he will forever repent.
<u>thoughtless</u>	Without care or thought for others. To think a few minutes of thoughtless pleasure could end in this.
unheeding	Marked by or paying little heed or attention-Franklin D. Roosevelt. Mary unheeding watched the television.

foolish	Having or revealing stupidity. A foolish decision.
furious	(of the elements) as if showing violent anger. <i>He drove at a furious speed.</i>
heedless	Characterized by careless unconcern. <i>His heedless impetuosity.</i>
<u>hostile</u>	Impossible to bring into friendly accord. <i>Hostile</i> bid.
inadvertent	Happening by chance or unexpectedly or unintentionally. An inadvertent administrative error occurred that resulted in an overpayment.
inimical	Not friendly. An inimical critic.
<u>militant</u>	A militant reformer. <i>Militant</i> nations.
<u>oblivious</u>	Failing to keep in mind. Oblivious of the mounting pressures for political reform.
<u>psychopath</u>	Someone with a sociopathic personality a person with an antisocial personality disorder psychopath was once widely used but has now been superseded by sociopath. <i>Playground</i> psychopaths will gather around a fight to encourage the combatants.
quarrelsome	Given to quarreling. A moody quarrelsome man.
<u>rampage</u>	Violently angry and destructive behavior. Youths went on the rampage and wrecked a classroom.
rash	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences. Do something rash that he will forever repent.



rashly	Without careful consideration of the possible consequences; impetuously. Rashly Theresa accepts a second date with Tony.
<u>regardless</u>	In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks. The allowance is paid regardless of age or income.
<u>sociopath</u>	Someone with a sociopathic personality a person with an antisocial personality disorder psychopath was once widely used but has now been superseded by sociopath.
tempestuous	(of the elements) as if showing violent anger. <i>He had a reckless and tempestuous streak.</i>
unmindful	Lacking conscious awareness of. Not unmindful of the heavy responsibility.
unwary	Not alert to danger or deception- O.J.Campbell. The shrieks of unwary animals taken by surprise.
violent	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>Felt a violent dislike.</i>
<u>wanton</u>	Indulge in a carefree or voluptuous way of life. The sea breeze wanton ed among the quivering leaves of the chestnut tree.
