### Definitions of "Recoil" as a verb

- Suddenly spring or flinch back in fear, horror, or disgust.
- (of an action) have an adverse reactive effect on (the originator).
- Spring back, as from a forceful thrust.
- Spring back; spring away from an impact.
- Feel fear, horror, or disgust at the thought of something.
- Draw back, as with fear or pain.
- (of a gun) move abruptly backwards as a reaction on firing a bullet, shell, or other missile.

<b>feel disgust at</b>	Undergo passive experience of.
<b>feel revulsion at</b>	Be felt or perceived in a certain way.
<b><u>flinch</u></b>	Draw back, as with fear or pain. <i>She <b>flinched</b> when they showed the slaughtering of the calf.</i>
<b>fly back</b>	Cause to fly or float.
<b>funk</b>	Draw back, as with fear or pain. <i>I could have seen him this morning but I <b>funked</b> it.</i>

<b>hesitate at</b>	Interrupt temporarily an activity before continuing.
<b>jerk back</b>	Pull, or move with a sudden movement.
<b>jump back</b>	Bypass.
<b><u>kick</u></b>	Chiefly in rugby score a goal by a kick. <i>He <b>kicked</b> the door open.</i>
<b>kick back</b>	Spring back, as from a forceful thrust.
<b>pull back</b>	Operate when rowing a boat.
<b>quail</b>	Draw back, as with fear or pain.
<b><u>rebound</u></b>	(of an event or action) have an unexpected adverse consequence for (someone, especially the person responsible for it). <i>Nicholas's tricks are <b>rebounding</b> on him.</i>
<b>rebound on</b>	Spring back; spring away from an impact.
<b>resile</b>	Abandon a position or a course of action. <i>The rubber tubes <b>resile</b>.</i>
<b>reverberate</b>	Spring back; spring away from an impact. <i>The waves <b>reverberate</b> as far away as the end of the building.</i>
<b><u>ricochet</u></b>	Appear to move with a series of ricochets. <i>They fired off a couple of rounds <b>ricocheting</b> the bullets against a wall.</i>
<b><u>shrink</u></b>	Reduce in size; reduce physically. <i>Hot water will <b>shrink</b> the sweater.</i>
<b>shrink from</b>	Wither, as with a loss of moisture.
<b>shy away from</b>	Throw quickly.
<b>spring</b>	Move rapidly or suddenly from a constrained position by or as if by the action of a spring. <i>The president sought to <b>spring</b> the hostages.</i>
<b>spring back</b>	Spring back spring away from an impact.
<b>squinch</b>	Cross one's eyes as if in strabismus.
<b>take a hop</b>	Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.
<b><u>wince</u></b>	Make a face indicating disgust or dislike. <i>She <b>winc</b>ed when she heard his pompous speech.</i>

<b><u>flinch</u></b>	An act of flinching. <i>She <b>flinched</b> when they showed the slaughtering of the calf.</i>
<b>forth</b>	From a particular thing or place or position forth is obsolete. <i>Go <b>forth</b> and preach.</i>
<b>languish</b>	Become feeble. <i>The prisoner has been <b>languishing</b> for years in the dungeon.</i>

<b>leap</b>	Cause to jump or leap. <i>He <b>leapt</b> on to the parapet.</i>
<b>lessen</b>	Make or become less; diminish. <i>The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessened</b>.</i>

<b>retrench</b>	(of an organization or individual) reduce costs or spending in response to economic difficulty. <i>Right wing parties which seek to <b>retrench</b> the welfare state.</i>
<b>shrink</b>	Become smaller or draw together. <i>Hot water will <b>shrink</b> the sweater.</i>
<b>shrivel</b>	Decrease in size, range, or extent. <i>As American interest <b>shrivelled</b> so did the government s.</i>
<b>spring</b>	Spring back spring away from an impact. <i>He might <b>spring</b> a few shillings more.</i>
<b>squat</b>	An exercise in which a person squats down and rises again while holding a barbell across one s shoulders. <i>The building <b>squatted</b> low.</i>
<b>wane</b>	(of a state or feeling) decrease in vigour or extent; become weaker. <i>Interest in the project <b>waned</b>.</i>
