<b>resolve</b>	Reach a conclusion after a discussion or deliberation. <i>The firm aims to <b>resolve</b> problems within 30 days.</i>
<b>resolve differences between</b>	Make clearly visible.
<b>restore friendly relations between</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken.
<b>restore harmony between</b>	Return to its original or usable and functioning condition.
<b>restore harmony to</b>	Return to its original or usable and functioning condition.
<b><u>reunite</u></b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>The three friends <b>reunited</b> in 1959.</i>
<b>settle</b>	Settle conclusively come to terms. <i>She <b>settled</b> the teacart.</i>

<b>smooth over</b>	Free from obstructions.

<b>sort out</b>	Arrange or order by classes or categories.

<b>submit</b>	Refer for judgment or consideration. <i>The lawyers <b>submitted</b> the material to the court.</i>

<b><u>consort</u></b>	A wife, husband, or companion, in particular the spouse of a reigning monarch. <i>It did not <b>consort</b> with his idea of scientific government.</i>
<b><u>constitution</u></b>	The constitution written at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 and subsequently ratified by the original thirteen states. <i>The individual s <b>constitution</b> is commonly described as his nature.</i>
<b><u>correspond</u></b>	Take the place of or be parallel or equivalent to. <i>The doctor and I <b>corresponded</b> for more than two decades.</i>
<b><u>finalize</u></b>	Make final; put the last touches on; put into final form. <i>Efforts intensified to <b>finalize</b> plans for post war reconstruction.</i>

<b><u>orchestrate</u></b>	Write an orchestra score for. <i>The song cycle was stunningly arranged and <b>orchestrated</b>.</i>
<b><u>organize</u></b>	Bring order and organization to. <i>Julie <b>organized</b> food and drink for the band.</i>
<b><u>partner</u></b>	A person who is a member of a partnership. <i>Young farmers who <b>partnered</b> Isabel to the village dance.</i>

<b>partnership</b>	A cooperative relationship between people or groups who agree to share responsibility for achieving some specific goal. <i>She will be eligible for a <b>partnership</b> after a few years.</i>
