## Reconsider as a Verb

### Definitions of "Reconsider" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “reconsider” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Consider again; give new consideration to; usually with a view to changing.*
- *Consider again (a bill) that had been voted upon before, with a view to altering it.*
- *Consider (something) again, especially for a possible change of decision regarding it.*

### Synonyms of "Reconsider" as a verb (11 Words)

<b>have another think about</b>	Have left.
<b>look at in a different light</b>	Look forward to the probable occurrence of.
<b>re-examine</b>	Question after cross-examination by opposing counsel.
<b>reappraise</b>	Appraise anew. <i>The Tory party has <b>reappraised</b> its strategy.</i>
<b>reassess</b>	Revise or renew one’s assessment. <i>We have decided to <b>reassess</b> our timetable.</i>

<b>rethink</b>	Change one's mind. <i>The government were forced to <b>rethink</b> their plans.</i>
<b>review</b>	Hold a review of troops. <i>I <b>reviewed</b> the material before the test.</i>
<b>revise</b>	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>The book was published in 1960 and <b>revised</b> in 1968.</i>
<b>take another look at</b>	Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route.
<b>think better of</b>	Expect, believe, or suppose.
<b>think over</b>	Imagine or visualize.

### Usage Examples of "Reconsider" as a verb

- *Won't you reconsider your decision?*
- *I beg you to reconsider.*
- *They called on the US government to reconsider its policy.*

### Associations of "Reconsider" (30 Words)

<b>anticipatory</b>	(of a breach of contract) taking the form of an announcement or indication that a contract will not be honoured. <i>An <b>anticipatory</b> flash of excitement.</i>
<b>assuming</b>	Arrogant or presumptuous. <i>On a subject like this it would be too <b>assuming</b> for me to decide.</i>
<b>bethink</b>	Come to think. <i>He bethought himself of the verse from the Book of Proverbs.</i>
<b>brood</b>	A large family of children. <i>She had <b>brooded</b> over the subject a thousand times.</i>
<b>cogitate</b>	Use or exercise the mind or one's power of reason in order to make inferences, decisions, or arrive at a solution or judgments. <i>He stroked his beard and retired to <b>cogitate</b>.</i>
<b>consider</b>	Show consideration for take into account. <i>Each application is <b>considered</b> on its merits.</i>
<b>consideration</b>	A fact or a motive taken into account in deciding something. <i>Your case needs very careful investigation and <b>consideration</b>.</i>

<b>contemplate</b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I <b>contemplated</b> leaving school and taking a full time job.</i>
<b>contemplation</b>	A form of Christian prayer or meditation in which a person seeks to pass beyond mental images and concepts to a direct experience of the divine. <i>He would retire to his room for study or <b>contemplation</b>.</i>
<u><b>deem</b></u>	Keep in mind or convey as a conviction or view. <i>The strike was <b>deemed</b> to be illegal.</i>
<u><b>deliberate</b></u>	Careful and unhurried. <i>With all <b>deliberate</b> speed.</i>
<b>imaginable</b>	Capable of being imagined. <i>The most spectacular views <b>imaginable</b>.</i>
<u><b>intend</b></u>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>She was <b>intended</b> to become the director.</i>
<b>intentionality</b>	The fact of being deliberate or purposive.
<b>introspect</b>	Reflect on one's own thoughts and feelings. <i>What they don't do is <b>introspect</b> much about the reasons for their plight.</i>
<u><b>meditate</b></u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>He went off to <b>meditate</b> on the new idea.</i>
<b>mirror</b>	Reflect as if in a mirror. <i>The stage is supposed to be the <b>mirror</b> of life.</i>
<b>mirrored</b>	Like or characteristic of a mirror image. <i>The room has wall to wall <b>mirrored</b> wardrobes.</i>
<b>mistakenly</b>	In a mistaken manner. <i>Warplanes <b>mistakenly</b> bombed a village.</i>
<b>mull</b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I <b>mulled</b> over the events of the afternoon.</i>
<u><b>muse</b></u>	In ancient Greek mythology any of 9 daughters of Zeus and Mnemosyne; protector of an art or science. <i>Euterpe was his <b>muse</b>.</i>
<u><b>ponder</b></u>	Think about (something) carefully, especially before making a decision or reaching a conclusion. <i>I <b>pondered</b> the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.</i>
<b>ponderable</b>	Capable of being weighed or considered. <i>Something <b>ponderable</b> from the outer world something of which we can say that its weight is so and so.</i>
<b>reckon</b>	Be of the opinion. <i>The Byzantine year was <b>reckoned</b> from 1 September.</i>

<b><u>reflect</u></b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>The main contract is progressing well which <b>reflects</b> great credit on those involved.</i>
<b><u>reminisce</u></b>	Recall the past. <i>They <b>reminisced</b> about their summers abroad.</i>
<b><u>ruminate</u></b>	Chew the cud. <i>Cows <b>ruminate</b>.</i>
<b><u>speculate</u></b>	Form a theory or conjecture about a subject without firm evidence. <i>Philosophers have <b>speculated</b> on the question of God for thousands of years.</i>
<b>thoughtfulness</b>	The trait of thinking carefully before acting. <i>I am touched by your <b>thoughtfulness</b>.</i>
<b>wrongheaded</b>	Obstinately perverse in judgment or opinion. <i>A <b>wrongheaded</b> policy.</i>
