- Consider (something) again, especially for a possible change of decision regarding it.

re-examine	Question after cross-examination by opposing counsel.
reappraise	Appraise anew. The Tory party has <b>reappraise</b> d its strategy.
reassess	Revise or renew one's assessment. We have decided to <b>reassess</b> our timetable.



<u>rethink</u>	Change one's mind. The government were forced to <b>rethink</b> their plans.
review	Hold a review of troops. I <b>review</b> ed the material before the test.
revise	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>The book was published in 1960 and <b>revise</b>d in 1968.</i>
take another look at	Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route.
think better of	Expect, believe, or suppose.
think over	Imagine or visualize.

- I beg you to reconsider.
- They called on the US government to reconsider its policy.

# Associations of "Reconsider" (30 Words)

<u>anticipatory</u>	(of a breach of contract) taking the form of an announcement or indication that a contract will not be honoured. <i>An anticipatory flash of excitement.</i>
assuming	Arrogant or presumptuous. On a subject like this it would be too <b>assuming</b> for me to decide.
bethink	Come to think. <i>He bethought himself of the verse from the Book of Proverbs.</i>
<u>brood</u>	A large family of children. She had <b>brood</b> ed over the subject a thousand times.
cogitate	Use or exercise the mind or one's power of reason in order to make inferences, decisions, or arrive at a solution or judgments. <i>He stroked his beard and retired to cogitate.</i>
consider	Show consideration for take into account. Each application is <b>consider</b> ed on its merits.
consideration	A fact or a motive taken into account in deciding something. Your case needs very careful investigation and <b>consideration</b> .



contemplate	Reflect deeply on a subject. I <b>contemplate</b> d leaving school and taking a full time job.
contemplation	A form of Christian prayer or meditation in which a person seeks to pass beyond mental images and concepts to a direct experience of the divine. <i>He would retire to his room for study or contemplation</i> .
<u>deem</u>	Keep in mind or convey as a conviction or view. The strike was <b>deem</b> ed to be illegal.
<u>deliberate</u>	Careful and unhurried. With all <b>deliberate</b> speed.
imaginable	Capable of being imagined. The most spectacular views <b>imaginable</b> .
<u>intend</u>	Mean or intend to express or convey. She was <b>intend</b> ed to become the director.
intentionality	The fact of being deliberate or purposive.
introspect	Reflect on one's own thoughts and feelings. What they don t do is <b>introspect</b> much about the reasons for their plight.
<u>meditate</u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>He went off to <b>meditate</b> on the new idea.</i>
mirror	Reflect as if in a mirror. The stage is supposed to be the <b>mirror</b> of life.
mirrored	Like or characteristic of a mirror image. The room has wall to wall <b>mirrored</b> wardrobes.
mistakenly	In a mistaken manner. Warplanes <b>mistakenly</b> bombed a village.
mull	Reflect deeply on a subject. I <b>mull</b> ed over the events of the afternoon.
<u>muse</u>	In ancient Greek mythology any of 9 daughters of Zeus and Mnemosyne; protector of an art or science. <i>Euterpe was his <b>muse</b></i> .
<u>ponder</u>	Think about (something) carefully, especially before making a decision or reaching a conclusion. I <b>ponder</b> ed the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.
ponderable	Capable of being weighed or considered. Something <b>ponderable</b> from the outer world something of which we can say that its weight is so and so.
reckon	Be of the opinion. The Byzantine year was <b>reckon</b> ed from 1 September.



<u>reflect</u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. The main contract is progressing well which <b>reflect</b> s great credit on those involved.
<u>reminisce</u>	Recall the past. They <b>reminisce</b> d about their summers abroad.
<u>ruminate</u>	Chew the cuds. <i>Cows <b>ruminate</b></i> .
<u>speculate</u>	Form a theory or conjecture about a subject without firm evidence. Philosophers have <b>speculate</b> d on the question of God for thousands of years.
thoughtfulness	The trait of thinking carefully before acting. I am touched by your <b>thoughtfulness</b> .
wrongheaded	Obstinately perverse in judgment or opinion. A <b>wrongheaded</b> policy.
