Definitions of "Reconsider" as a verb

- *Consider again; give new consideration to; usually with a view to changing.*
- *Consider again (a bill) that had been voted upon before, with a view to altering it.*
- *Consider (something) again, especially for a possible change of decision regarding it.*

| re-examine | Question after cross-examination by opposing counsel. |
| reappraise | Appraise anew. <i>The Tory party has reappraised its strategy.</i> |
| reassess | Revise or renew one’s assessment. <i>We have decided to reassess our timetable.</i> |

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| rethink | Change one's mind. <i>The government were forced to rethink their plans.</i> |
| review | Hold a review of troops. <i>I reviewed the material before the test.</i> |
| revise | Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>The book was published in 1960 and revised in 1968.</i> |
| take another look at | Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route. |
| think better of | Expect, believe, or suppose. |
| think over | Imagine or visualize. |

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| anticipatory | (of a breach of contract) taking the form of an announcement or indication that a contract will not be honoured. <i>An anticipatory flash of excitement.</i> |
| assuming | Arrogant or presumptuous. <i>On a subject like this it would be too assuming for me to decide.</i> |
| bethink | Come to think. <i>He bethought himself of the verse from the Book of Proverbs.</i> |
| brood | A large family of children. <i>She had brooded over the subject a thousand times.</i> |
| cogitate | Use or exercise the mind or one's power of reason in order to make inferences, decisions, or arrive at a solution or judgments. <i>He stroked his beard and retired to cogitate.</i> |
| consider | Show consideration for take into account. <i>Each application is considered on its merits.</i> |
| consideration | A fact or a motive taken into account in deciding something. <i>Your case needs very careful investigation and consideration.</i> |

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| contemplate | Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I contemplated leaving school and taking a full time job.</i> |
| contemplation | A form of Christian prayer or meditation in which a person seeks to pass beyond mental images and concepts to a direct experience of the divine. <i>He would retire to his room for study or contemplation.</i> |
| <u>deem</u> | Keep in mind or convey as a conviction or view. <i>The strike was deemed to be illegal.</i> |
| <u>deliberate</u> | Careful and unhurried. <i>With all deliberate speed.</i> |
| imaginable | Capable of being imagined. <i>The most spectacular views imaginable.</i> |
| <u>intend</u> | Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>She was intended to become the director.</i> |
| intentionality | The fact of being deliberate or purposive. |
| introspect | Reflect on one's own thoughts and feelings. <i>What they don't do is introspect much about the reasons for their plight.</i> |
| <u>meditate</u> | Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>He went off to meditate on the new idea.</i> |
| mirror | Reflect as if in a mirror. <i>The stage is supposed to be the mirror of life.</i> |
| mirrored | Like or characteristic of a mirror image. <i>The room has wall to wall mirrored wardrobes.</i> |
| mistakenly | In a mistaken manner. <i>Warplanes mistakenly bombed a village.</i> |
| mull | Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I mulled over the events of the afternoon.</i> |
| <u>muse</u> | In ancient Greek mythology any of 9 daughters of Zeus and Mnemosyne; protector of an art or science. <i>Euterpe was his muse.</i> |
| <u>ponder</u> | Think about (something) carefully, especially before making a decision or reaching a conclusion. <i>I pondered the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.</i> |
| ponderable | Capable of being weighed or considered. <i>Something ponderable from the outer world something of which we can say that its weight is so and so.</i> |
| reckon | Be of the opinion. <i>The Byzantine year was reckoned from 1 September.</i> |

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| <u>reflect</u> | Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>The main contract is progressing well which reflects great credit on those involved.</i> |
| <u>reminisce</u> | Recall the past. <i>They reminisced about their summers abroad.</i> |
| <u>ruminate</u> | Chew the cud. <i>Cows ruminate.</i> |
| <u>speculate</u> | Form a theory or conjecture about a subject without firm evidence. <i>Philosophers have speculated on the question of God for thousands of years.</i> |
| thoughtfulness | The trait of thinking carefully before acting. <i>I am touched by your thoughtfulness.</i> |
| wrongheaded | Obstinately perverse in judgment or opinion. <i>A wrongheaded policy.</i> |
