- cheer** Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts.

- embolden** Give (someone) the courage or confidence to do something.
*Centre **embolden** and underline the heading.*
- hearten** Make more cheerful or confident.
*She was **heartened** to observe that the effect was faintly comic.*
- perform again** Carry out or perform an action.
- play** Play a role or part.
*Princeton **plays** Yale this weekend.*
- quicken** (of a woman) reach a stage in pregnancy when movements of the fetus can be felt.
*The fetus **quicken**ed.*

reanimate	Give fresh vigour or impetus to. <i>His personal dislike of the man was reanimated.</i>
reassemble	Put (something) together again. <i>The trucks had to be reassembled on arrival.</i>
rebuild	Build (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed. <i>The house was rebuild after it was hit by a bomb.</i>
recondition	Condition again. <i>He reconditioned the old appliances.</i>
reconstruct	Build again. <i>A small area of painted Roman plaster has been reconstructed.</i>
redo	Redecorate (a room or building). <i>The house is being redone exactly to suit his taste.</i>
refashion	Fashion (something) again or differently. <i>The industry reshaped and refashioned itself.</i>
refurbish	Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building). <i>We refurbished the guest wing.</i>
remake	Make new. <i>The bed would be more comfortable if it were remade.</i>
remodel	Do over, as of (part of) a house. <i>She remodelled the head with careful fingers.</i>
renovate	Make brighter and prettier. <i>This will renovate my spirits.</i>
repair	Put right (an unwelcome situation). <i>She repaired her TV set.</i>
repeat	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>She repeated what I d said.</i>
replicate	Make an exact copy of; reproduce. <i>He could never replicate his brilliant performance of the magic trick.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The week at the spa restored me.</i>
revamp	Provide (a shoe) with a new vamp. <i>Revamp my old boots.</i>
revive	Give new strength or energy to. <i>The cool refreshing water revived us all.</i>
revivify	Give new life or energy to. <i>They revivified a wine industry that had all but vanished.</i>

resurface	Appear again. <i>I helped my mother to resurface the kitchen floor.</i>

resurge	A further or fresh surge; a surge back or backwards. <i>His need for a meal resurged.</i>
resurgence	An increase or revival after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i>A resurgence of interest in religion.</i>
resurgent	Increasing or reviving after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i>Resurgent nationalism.</i>
resurrect	Return from the dead. <i>He queried whether Jesus was indeed resurrected.</i>
resuscitate	Return to consciousness. <i>An ambulance crew tried to resuscitate him.</i>
revitalization	The action of imbuing something with new life and vitality. <i>The city has seen revitalization of its economy.</i>
revitalize	Restore strength. <i>A package of spending cuts to revitalize the economy.</i>
revive	Cause to regain consciousness. <i>Interest in ESP revived.</i>
