
Recreate as a Verb

Definitions of "Recreate" as a verb

- Create again.
- Give encouragement to.
- Reproduce; re-enact.
- Give new life or energy to.
- Engage in recreational activities rather than work; occupy oneself in a diversion.





Synonyms of "Recreate" as a verb (26 Words)

<u>animate</u>	Give lifelike qualities to. She has animate d the government with a sense of political direction.
<u>cheer</u>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. Everybody cheer ed the birthday boy.
<u>embolden</u>	Give (someone) the courage or confidence to do something. Centre embolden and underline the heading.
hearten	Make more cheerful or confident. She was hearten ed to observe that the effect was faintly comic.
perform again	Carry out or perform an action.
play	Play a role or part. Princeton play s Yale this weekend.
quicken	(of a woman) reach a stage in pregnancy when movements of the fetus can be felt. <i>The fetus quickened.</i>



reanimate	Give fresh vigour or impetus to. His personal dislike of the man was reanimate d.
reassemble	Put (something) together again. The trucks had to be reassemble d on arrival.
<u>rebuild</u>	Build (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed. The house was rebuild after it was hit by a bomb.
recondition	Condition again. He recondition ed the old appliances.
<u>reconstruct</u>	Build again. A small area of painted Roman plaster has been reconstruct ed.
<u>redo</u>	Redecorate (a room or building. The house is being redo ne exactly to suit his taste.
refashion	Fashion (something) again or differently. The industry reshaped and refashion ed itself.
<u>refurbish</u>	Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building. We refurbish ed the guest wing.
<u>remake</u>	Make new. The bed would be more comfortable if it were remade.
remodel	Do over, as of (part of) a house. She remodel led the head with careful fingers.
renovate	Make brighter and prettier. This will renovate my spirits.
repair	Put right (an unwelcome situation. She repair ed her TV set.
<u>repeat</u>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. She repeat ed what I d said.
<u>replicate</u>	Make an exact copy of; reproduce. <i>He could never replicate his brilliant performance of the magic trick.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. The week at the spa restore d me.
<u>revamp</u>	Provide (a shoe) with a new vamp. <i>Revamp</i> my old boots.
revive	Give new strength or energy to. The cool refreshing water revive d us all.
revivify	Give new life or energy to. They revivified a wine industry that had all but vanished.






vivify Give new life or energy to. His remarks always vivify an otherwise dull story.

- *She recreated the feeling of the 1920's with her stage setting.*
- He recreated Mallory's 1942 climb for TV.

alive	In operation. The happiest person alive .
<u>animate</u>	Endowed with feeling and unstructured consciousness- T.E.Lawrence. <i>The word dog is animate.</i>
inanimate	Appearing dead; not breathing or having no perceptible pulse. <i>Inanimate</i> objects.
life	An account of the series of events making up a person s life. <i>His heroism saved a life</i> .
live	Have life be alive. The nerve is a live .
lively	Quick and energetic. <i>Lively</i> and attractive parents.
reanimate	Give fresh vigour or impetus to. In the vain hope of being reanimate d he left his body to science.
recover	Get or find back recover the use of. He recover ed his balance and sped on.
refresh	Refresh one s memory. A poor screen display which relies on scrolling refresh .
<u>regenerate</u>	(especially in Christian use) give a new and higher spiritual nature to. <i>Regenerate</i> hatred.
<u>reincarnation</u>	A new version of something from the past. <i>His reincarnation as a lion.</i>
<u>rejuvenate</u>	Restore (a river or stream) to a condition characteristic of a younger landscape. A new challenge may be just what he needs to rejuvenate his career.
<u>renew</u>	Cause to appear in a new form. A change of scenery will recharge your batteries and renew your zest for life.
renovate	Refresh; reinvigorate. This will renovate my spirits.
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. The effort to restore him to office isn t working.
resurface	Appear again. I helped my mother to resurface the kitchen floor.



resurge	A further or fresh surge; a surge back or backwards. <i>His need for a meal resurged.</i>
<u>resurgence</u>	An increase or revival after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. A resurgence of interest in religion.
resurgent	Increasing or reviving after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i>Resurgent</i> nationalism.
<u>resurrect</u>	Return from the dead. He queried whether Jesus was indeed resurrect ed.
resuscitate	Return to consciousness. An ambulance crew tried to resuscitate him.
revitalization	The action of imbuing something with new life and vitality. The city has seen revitalization of its economy.
<u>revitalize</u>	Restore strength. A package of spending cuts to revitalize the economy.
revive	Cause to regain consciousness. Interest in ESP revive d.
risen	(of e.g. celestial bodies) above the horizon. <i>The risen sun.</i>
<u>verve</u>	Vigour and spirit or enthusiasm. Kollo sings with supreme verve and flexibility.
vim	A healthy capacity for vigorous activity. <i>He seemed full of vim and vigor.</i>
vitalism	The theory that the origin and phenomena of life are dependent on a force or principle distinct from purely chemical or physical forces.
<u>vitality</u>	An energetic style. <i>The vitality of seeds.</i>
vivify	Make more lively or interesting; enliven. His remarks always vivify an otherwise dull story.
