find	Make a discovery make a new finding. <i>She ll never find her way to the house on her own.</i>
get back	Take vengeance on or get even.
get back on one's feet	Receive as a retribution or punishment.
get back to normal	Communicate with a place or person; establish communication with, as if by telephone.
get better	Reach and board.
get over something	Be stricken by an illness, fall victim to an illness.
get well	Purchase.

go back	Go through in search of something; search through someone's belongings in an unauthorized way.
have something returned	Cause to be born.

redeem	Save from sins. <i>Statutes enabled state peasants to redeem their land.</i>
<u>regain</u>	Obtain possession or use of (something, typically a quality or ability) again after losing it. <i>She regained control of herself.</i>
regain one's health	Get or find back; recover the use of.
regain one's strength	Get or find back; recover the use of.
repossess	Claim back. <i>565 homes were repossessed for non payment of mortgages.</i>
rescue	Save (someone) from a dangerous or difficult situation. <i>He got out of his chair to rescue his cup of coffee.</i>
retrieve	Recall (something). <i>He made one last desperate attempt to retrieve the situation.</i>
win back	Be the winner in a contest or competition; be victorious.

recoup	Deduct or keep back (part of a sum due). <i>Oil companies are keen to recoup their investment.</i>
recover	Get or find back; recover the use of. <i>Only 13 per cent of CFC refrigerant was being recovered from domestic fridges.</i>
recovery	The act of regaining or saving something lost (or in danger of becoming lost). <i>The brace is used as a recovery stroke to avoid capsizing.</i>
<u>regain</u>	Obtain possession or use of (something, typically a quality or ability) again after losing it. <i>She regained control of herself.</i>

rehabilitative	Designed to accomplish rehabilitation- J.B.Costello. <i>Rehabilitative exercises.</i>
reimburse	Reimburse or compensate someone as for a loss. <i>Your expenses will be reimbursed.</i>
<u>reinstate</u>	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not reinstated.</i>
<u>replenish</u>	Fill something that had previously been emptied. <i>All creatures need sleep to replenish their energies.</i>
resilience	The ability of a substance or object to spring back into shape; elasticity. <i>Nylon is excellent in wearability abrasion resistance and resilience.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration of capital punishment.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Restore the forest to its original pristine condition.</i>
resuscitation	The act of reviving a person and returning them to consciousness. <i>Paramedics were called and aggressive resuscitation was performed.</i>
retrieval	The process of getting something back from somewhere. <i>Storage and retrieval systems.</i>
retrieve	An act of retrieving something, especially game that has been shot. <i>Labradors are used to retrieve the birds after the flush.</i>
<u>revitalize</u>	Give new life or vigor to. <i>A package of spending cuts to revitalize the economy.</i>
<u>revival</u>	An improvement in the condition, strength, or fortunes of someone or something. <i>The revivals of the nineteenth century.</i>
revive	Restore from a depressed, inactive, or unused state. <i>He revived this style of opera.</i>
treatment	A session of beauty or healthcare. <i>The directive required equal treatment for men and women in social security schemes.</i>
