return A coming to or returning home. *Product areas are being developed to produce maximum returns.*






Usage Examples of "Recurrence" as a noun

Associations of "Recurrence" (30 Words)

again	Used to ask someone to repeat something. I never saw any signs but then again maybe I wasn t looking.
<u>ceaseless</u>	Constant and unending. The ceaseless thunder of surf.
constant	Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection. The constant background noise of the city.
<u>continual</u>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>The continual banging of the shutters.</i>
continuous	Of a function or curve; extending without break or irregularity. There are continuous advances in design and production.
<u>frequent</u>	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. A frequent guest.



(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.
Sporadically and infrequently. We met up occasionally for a drink.
Many times at short intervals. An oft quoted tenet.
Over the entire area. <i>The car flipped over</i> .
A perennial plant. Perennial manifestations of urban crisis.
Never ending or changing. A perpetual secretary of the society.
A bond or other security with no fixed maturity date. <i>He did not believe in the perpetuity of military rule.</i>
Continually recurring to the mind- Claudia Cassidy. PCBs are persistent environmental contaminants.
The recurrence of an undesirable condition. A recrudescence of racism.
Recurring again and again. She had a recurrent dream about falling.
Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.
A deterioration in someone's state of health after a temporary improvement. <i>Two of the patients in remission</i> relapse <i>d after 48 months.</i>
An abstraction belonging to or characteristic of two entities or parts together. His attorney argued for the relation back of the amended complaint to the time the initial complaint was filed.
Harsh or inflexible. The relentless heat of the desert.
Recurring again and again. There were repeated attempts to negotiate.
Repetitive and persistent. <i>Repetitive</i> movement.



return	A mechanism or key on a typewriter that returns the carriage to a fixed position at the start of a new line. <i>Falsification of the election return</i> .
<u>sequence</u>	Play or record music with a sequencer. <i>He played the trumps in sequence.</i>
sequential	In regular succession without gaps. <i>Sequential</i> processing of data files.
unceasing	Not coming to an end; continuous. The unceasing efforts of the staff.
<u>unchanging</u>	Not changing; remaining the same. The party stood for unchanging principles.
uninterrupted	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows uninterrupted work weeks.
<u>unremitting</u>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. Unremitting demands of hunger.
<u>yearly</u>	Once a year or every year. Annual or yearly income.
