- constant** Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection.  
*The **constant** background noise of the city.*
- continual** Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption.  
*The **continual** banging of the shutters.*
- continuous** Of a function or curve; extending without break or irregularity.  
*There are **continuous** advances in design and production.*
- frequent** Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place.  
*A **frequent** guest.*

<b>incessant</b>	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>Night and day we live with the <b>incessant</b> noise of the city.</i>
<b><u>occasionally</u></b>	Sporadically and infrequently. <i>We met up <b>occasionally</b> for a drink.</i>
<b>oft</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>An <b>oft</b> quoted tenet.</i>
<b><u>over</u></b>	Over the entire area. <i>The car flipped <b>over</b>.</i>
<b><u>perennial</u></b>	A perennial plant. <i><b>Perennial</b> manifestations of urban crisis.</i>
<b>perpetual</b>	Never ending or changing. <i>A <b>perpetual</b> secretary of the society.</i>
<b><u>perpetuity</u></b>	A bond or other security with no fixed maturity date. <i>He did not believe in the <b>perpetuity</b> of military rule.</i>
<b>persistent</b>	Continually recurring to the mind- Claudia Cassidy. <i>PCBs are <b>persistent</b> environmental contaminants.</i>
<b>recrudescence</b>	The recurrence of an undesirable condition. <i>A <b>recrudescence</b> of racism.</i>
<b><u>recurrent</u></b>	Recurring again and again. <i>She had a <b>recurrent</b> dream about falling.</i>
<b><u>recurring</u></b>	Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>They are haunted by a <b>recurring</b> image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
<b><u>relapse</u></b>	A deterioration in someone's state of health after a temporary improvement. <i>Two of the patients in remission <b>relapsed</b> after 48 months.</i>
<b>relation</b>	An abstraction belonging to or characteristic of two entities or parts together. <i>His attorney argued for the <b>relation</b> back of the amended complaint to the time the initial complaint was filed.</i>
<b><u>relentless</u></b>	Harsh or inflexible. <i>The <b>relentless</b> heat of the desert.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Recurring again and again. <i>There were <b>repeated</b> attempts to negotiate.</i>
<b><u>repetitive</u></b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i><b>Repetitive</b> movement.</i>

<b>return</b>	A mechanism or key on a typewriter that returns the carriage to a fixed position at the start of a new line. <i>Falsification of the election <b>return</b>.</i>
<b><u>sequence</u></b>	Play or record music with a sequencer. <i>He played the trumps in <b>sequence</b>.</i>
<b>sequential</b>	In regular succession without gaps. <i><b>Sequential</b> processing of data files.</i>
<b>unceasing</b>	Not coming to an end; continuous. <i>The <b>unceasing</b> efforts of the staff.</i>
<b><u>unchanging</u></b>	Not changing; remaining the same. <i>The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.</i>
<b>uninterrupted</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows <b>uninterrupted</b> work weeks.</i>
<b><u>unremitting</u></b>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. <i><b>Unremitting</b> demands of hunger.</i>
<b><u>yearly</u></b>	Once a year or every year. <i>Annual or <b>yearly</b> income.</i>
