- continual** Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption.
*The **continual** banging of the shutters.*
- continuous** Of a function or curve; extending without break or irregularity.
*There are **continuous** advances in design and production.*
- frequent** Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place.
*A **frequent** guest.*

incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.</i>
<u>occasionally</u>	Sporadically and infrequently. <i>We met up occasionally for a drink.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>An oft quoted tenet.</i>
<u>over</u>	Over the entire area. <i>The car flipped over.</i>
<u>perennial</u>	A perennial plant. <i>Perennial manifestations of urban crisis.</i>
perpetual	Never ending or changing. <i>A perpetual secretary of the society.</i>
<u>perpetuity</u>	A bond or other security with no fixed maturity date. <i>He did not believe in the perpetuity of military rule.</i>
persistent	Continually recurring to the mind- Claudia Cassidy. <i>PCBs are persistent environmental contaminants.</i>
recrudescence	The recurrence of an undesirable condition. <i>A recrudescence of racism.</i>
<u>recurrent</u>	Recurring again and again. <i>She had a recurrent dream about falling.</i>
<u>recurring</u>	Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
<u>relapse</u>	A deterioration in someone's state of health after a temporary improvement. <i>Two of the patients in remission relapsed after 48 months.</i>
relation	An abstraction belonging to or characteristic of two entities or parts together. <i>His attorney argued for the relation back of the amended complaint to the time the initial complaint was filed.</i>
<u>relentless</u>	Harsh or inflexible. <i>The relentless heat of the desert.</i>
repeated	Recurring again and again. <i>There were repeated attempts to negotiate.</i>
<u>repetitive</u>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>Repetitive movement.</i>

return	A mechanism or key on a typewriter that returns the carriage to a fixed position at the start of a new line. <i>Falsification of the election return.</i>
<u>sequence</u>	Play or record music with a sequencer. <i>He played the trumps in sequence.</i>
sequential	In regular succession without gaps. <i>Sequential processing of data files.</i>
unceasing	Not coming to an end; continuous. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
<u>unchanging</u>	Not changing; remaining the same. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i>
uninterrupted	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows uninterrupted work weeks.</i>
<u>unremitting</u>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. <i>Unremitting demands of hunger.</i>
<u>yearly</u>	Once a year or every year. <i>Annual or yearly income.</i>
