Definitions of "Recurrent" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “recurrent” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Recurring again and again.*
- *(of a nerve or blood vessel) turning back so as to reverse direction.*
- *Occurring often or repeatedly.*



Synonyms of "Recurrent" as an adjective (14 Words)

- chronic** Of a person having a chronic illness.
*A **chronic** invalid.*
- continual** Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption.
***Continual** is often used interchangeably with continuous.*
- cyclic** (of a flower) having its parts arranged in whorls.
***Cyclic** petals.*
- cyclical** Recurring in cycles.
*The **cyclical** nature of the cement industry.*
- frequent** Frequently encountered.
*A **frequent** visitor to Scotland.*
- habitual** Commonly used or practiced; usual.
*A **habitual** late sleeper.*

- perennial** (of a stream or spring) flowing throughout the year.
*His **perennial** distrust of the media.*
- periodic** Relating to the periodic table of the elements.
*The **periodic** appearance of the seventeen year locust.*
- recurring** (of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind.
*They are haunted by a **recurring** image of their daughter on the night she died.*
- regular** Relating to a person who does something regularly.
*Her **regular** bedtime.*
- reiterative** Marked by iteration.
- repeated** Recurring again and again.
*Despite **repeated** requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.*
- repetitive** Repetitive and persistent.
***Repetitive** movement.*
- seasonal** Relating to or characteristic of a particular season of the year.
*A selection of **seasonal** fresh fruit.*



Usage Examples of "Recurrent" as an adjective

- *She had a recurrent dream about falling.*
- *The recurrent nerve leaves the hypocerebral ganglion.*



Associations of "Recurrent" (30 Words)

- again** In addition to what has already been mentioned.
*They rehearsed the scene **again**.*
- always** Forever; throughout all time.
*If the marriage doesn't work out we can **always** get divorced.*
- ceaseless** Constant and unending.
*The fort was subjected to **ceaseless** bombardment.*
- constant** A number expressing a relation or property which remains the same in all circumstances, or for the same substance under the same conditions.
*The condition of struggle remained a **constant**.*

continuous	Forming a series with no exceptions or reversals. <i>There are continuous advances in design and production.</i>
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>She was ever so friendly.</i>
<u>frequent</u>	Frequently encountered. <i>Frequent complaints.</i>
<u>frequently</u>	Regularly or habitually; often. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i>
incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.</i>
<u>nonstop</u>	At all times. <i>A nonstop flight to Atlanta.</i>
<u>occasionally</u>	At infrequent or irregular intervals; now and then. <i>Open areas are only occasionally interrupted by clumps of trees.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i>
often	Frequently or in great quantities. <i>He often goes for long walks by himself.</i>
<u>perennial</u>	A perennial plant. <i>Perennial happiness.</i>
<u>periodic</u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
punctuality	The fact or quality of being on time. <i>He was a stickler for punctuality.</i>
recrudescence	A return of something after a period of abatement. <i>A recrudescence of racism.</i>
<u>recurrence</u>	The fact of occurring again. <i>A drug used to prevent the recurrence of breast cancer.</i>
<u>recurring</u>	Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
regular	A regular patron. <i>This place is a regular fisherman s paradise.</i>
regularity	The quality of being characterized by a fixed principle or rate. <i>He was famous for the regularity of his habits.</i>
<u>relentless</u>	Unceasingly intense. <i>The relentless heat of the desert.</i>

repeated	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>Despite repeated requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i>
repetitive	Repetitive and persistent. <i>A repetitive task.</i>
return	Make a return. <i>Her appetite had returned.</i>
sequence	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>A sonnet sequence.</i>
successively	Immediately one after another. <i>He served successively as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i>
unceasing	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
yearly	A reference book that is published regularly once every year. <i>Rent was paid yearly.</i>
