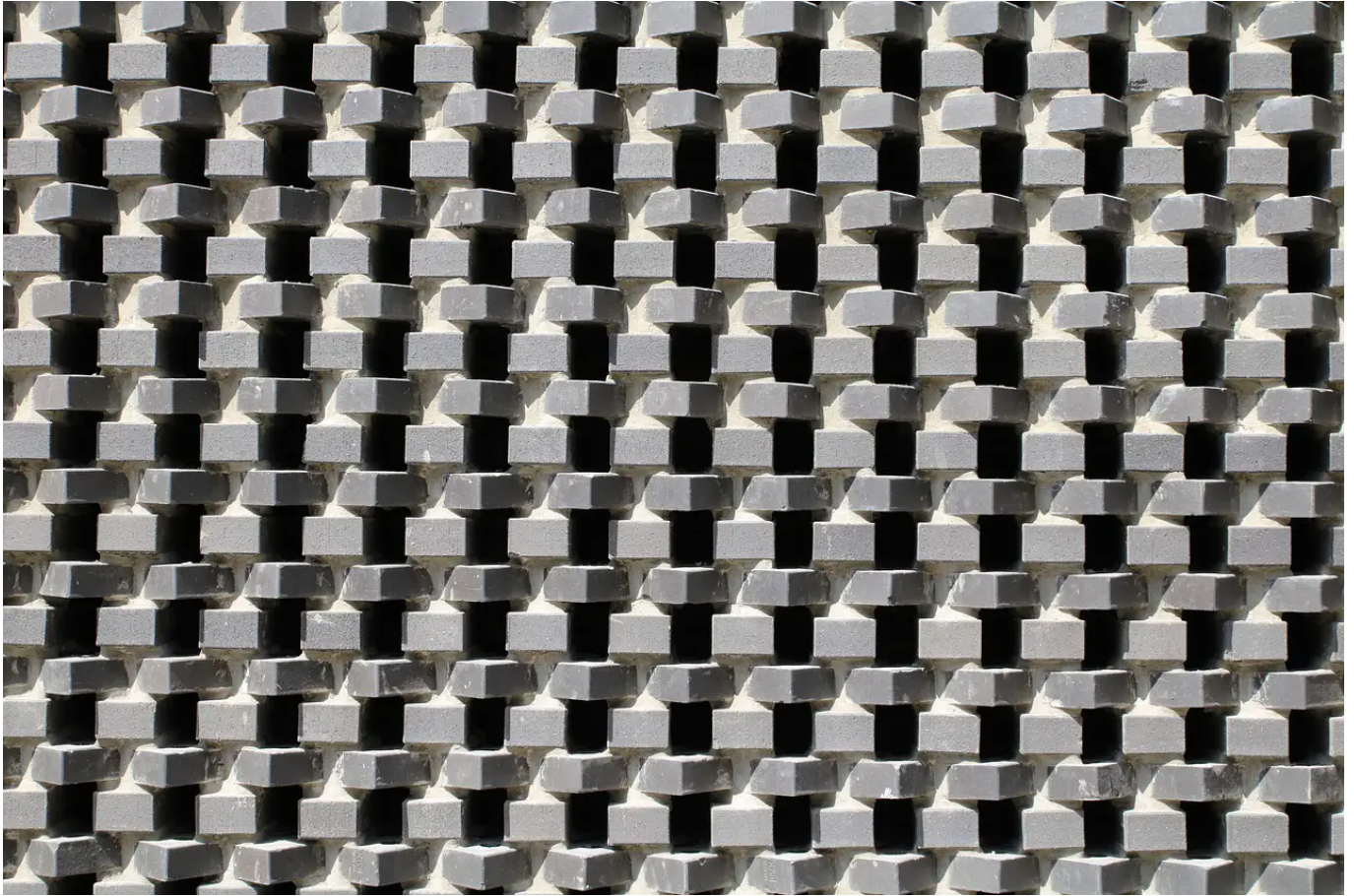

Definitions of "Recurring" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “recurring” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind.*
- *Coming back.*
- *Occurring again periodically or repeatedly.*



Synonyms of "Recurring" as an adjective (1 Word)

revenant Of or relating to or typical of a revenant.
A *revenant* ghost.



Usage Examples of "Recurring" as an adjective

- *Gratitude is a recurring theme in the book.*
- *They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.*

Associations of "Recurring" (30 Words)

activate	Convert (a substance, molecule, etc.) into a reactive form. Activate a metal.
again	Used to ask someone to repeat something. <i>The wages were low but they made half as much again in tips.</i>
<u>ceaseless</u>	Constant and unending. <i>The fort was subjected to ceaseless bombardment.</i>

constant	Unvarying in nature. <i>The constant background noise of the city.</i>
<u>continual</u>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>Continual is often used interchangeably with continuous.</i>
continuous	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>There are continuous advances in design and production.</i>
<u>frequent</u>	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. <i>Bears which persisted in frequenting developed areas.</i>
happen	Happen occur or be the case in the course of events or by chance Santayana. <i>The same thing happened to me.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
occur	Come to one's mind; suggest itself. <i>Sexism occurs in many workplaces.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i>
<u>over</u>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>He leant over and tapped me on the hand.</i>
<u>perennial</u>	A perennial plant. <i>His perennial distrust of the media.</i>
<u>periodic</u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic visits she made to her father.</i>
recrudescence	The recurrence of an undesirable condition. <i>A recrudescence of racism.</i>
recur	Return in thought or speech to something. <i>When the symptoms recurred the doctor diagnosed something different.</i>
<u>recurrence</u>	The fact of occurring again. <i>Fifty two patients had recurrences of intestinal problems.</i>
<u>recurrent</u>	(of a nerve or blood vessel) turning back so as to reverse direction. <i>She had a recurrent dream about falling.</i>
<u>relapse</u>	Go back to bad behavior. <i>He relapsed.</i>

<u>relentless</u>	Harsh or inflexible. <i>Relentless persecution.</i>
repeated	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>Despite repeated requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i>
<u>repetitive</u>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>Repetitive movement.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>The ANC had demanded the restitution of land seized from black people.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration looked exactly like the original.</i>
retrieval	The cognitive operation of accessing information in memory. <i>Online information retrieval.</i>
return	A good rate of return. <i>McAllister went out in 43 and returned in 32.</i>
reversion	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>A problem applicable to most variegated plants is that of reversion.</i>
<u>revert</u>	A person who has converted to the Islamic faith. <i>On reverting our eyes every step presented some new and admirable scene.</i>
<u>sequence</u>	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>They sequenced the human genome.</i>
<u>yearly</u>	A reference book that is published regularly once every year. <i>Annual or yearly income.</i>
