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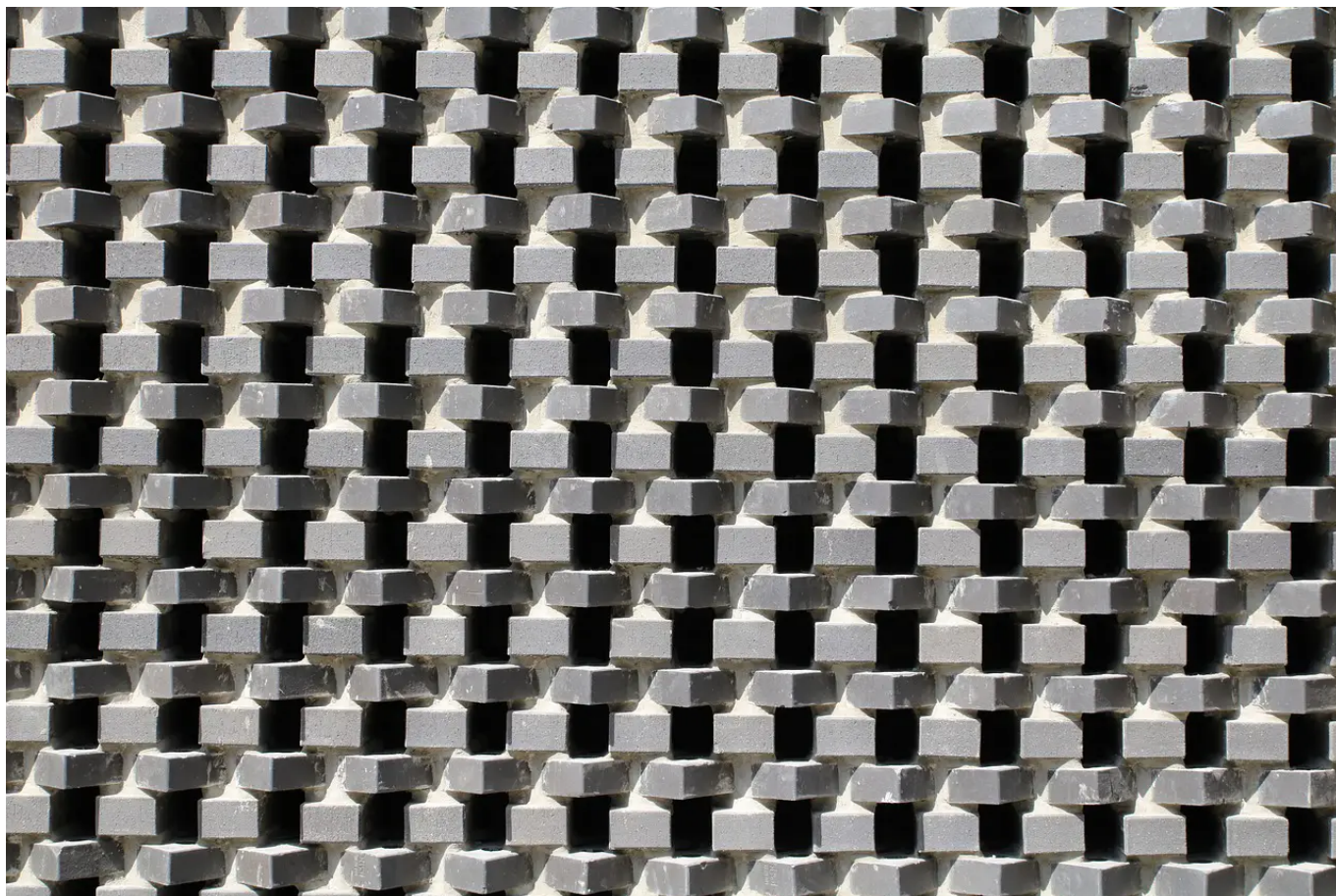

## **Recurring as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Recurring" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “recurring” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind.*
- *Coming back.*
- *Occurring again periodically or repeatedly.*



## Synonyms of "Recurring" as an adjective (1 Word)

**revenant** Of or relating to or typical of a revenant.  
A *revenant* ghost.



## Usage Examples of "Recurring" as an adjective

- *Gratitude is a recurring theme in the book.*
- *They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.*

## Associations of "Recurring" (30 Words)

<b>activate</b>	Convert (a substance, molecule, etc.) into a reactive form. <b>Activate</b> a metal.
<b>again</b>	Used to ask someone to repeat something. <i>The wages were low but they made half as much <b>again</b> in tips.</i>
<b><u>ceaseless</u></b>	Constant and unending. <i>The fort was subjected to <b>ceaseless</b> bombardment.</i>



<b>constant</b>	Unvarying in nature. <i>The <b>constant</b> background noise of the city.</i>
<u><b>continual</b></u>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i><b>Continual</b> is often used interchangeably with continuous.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>There are <b>continuous</b> advances in design and production.</i>
<u><b>frequent</b></u>	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. <i>Bears which persisted in <b>frequenting</b> developed areas.</i>
<b>happen</b>	Happen occur or be the case in the course of events or by chance Santayana. <i>The same thing <b>happened</b> to me.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The <b>incessant</b> beat of the music.</i>
<b>occur</b>	Come to one's mind; suggest itself. <i>Sexism <b>occurs</b> in many workplaces.</i>
<b>oft</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>We <b>often</b> met over a cup of coffee.</i>
<u><b>over</b></u>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>He leant <b>over</b> and tapped me on the hand.</i>
<u><b>perennial</b></u>	A perennial plant. <i>His <b>perennial</b> distrust of the media.</i>
<u><b>periodic</b></u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The <b>periodic</b> visits she made to her father.</i>
<b>recrudescence</b>	The recurrence of an undesirable condition. <i>A <b>recrudescence</b> of racism.</i>
<b>recur</b>	Return in thought or speech to something. <i>When the symptoms <b>recurred</b> the doctor diagnosed something different.</i>
<u><b>recurrence</b></u>	The fact of occurring again. <i>Fifty two patients had <b>recurrences</b> of intestinal problems.</i>
<u><b>recurrent</b></u>	(of a nerve or blood vessel) turning back so as to reverse direction. <i>She had a <b>recurrent</b> dream about falling.</i>
<u><b>relapse</b></u>	Go back to bad behavior. <i>He <b>relapsed</b>.</i>

<b><u>relentless</u></b>	Harsh or inflexible. <i><b>Relentless</b> persecution.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>Despite <b>repeated</b> requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i>
<b><u>repetitive</u></b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i><b>Repetitive</b> movement.</i>
<b><u>restitution</u></b>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>The ANC had demanded the <b>restitution</b> of land seized from black people.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> looked exactly like the original.</i>
<b>retrieval</b>	The cognitive operation of accessing information in memory. <i>Online information <b>retrieval</b>.</i>
<b>return</b>	A good rate of return. <i>McAllister went out in 43 and <b>returned</b> in 32.</i>
<b>reversion</b>	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>A problem applicable to most variegated plants is that of <b>reversion</b>.</i>
<b><u>revert</u></b>	A person who has converted to the Islamic faith. <i>On <b>reverting</b> our eyes every step presented some new and admirable scene.</i>
<b><u>sequence</u></b>	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>They <b>sequenced</b> the human genome.</i>
<b><u>yearly</u></b>	A reference book that is published regularly once every year. <i>Annual or <b>yearly</b> income.</i>
