depict	Portray in words; describe. <i>This scene depicts country life.</i>
describe	Give a detailed account in words of. <i>A single light is seen to describe a circle.</i>
designate	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>Certain schools are designated science schools.</i>
direct	Give directions to point somebody into a certain direction. <i>His smile was directed at Lois.</i>
entrust	Put into the care or protection of someone. <i>You persuade people to entrust their savings to you.</i>
go into	Give support (to) or make a choice (of) one out of a group or number.
hand on	Guide or conduct or usher somewhere.
hand over	Place into the hands or custody of.
have a bearing on	Get something; come into possession of.

<u>name</u>	Give or make a list of name individually give the names of. <i>Name your accomplices.</i>
note	Make a written note of. <i>She noted everything the teacher said that morning.</i>
pass	Pass into a specified state or condition. <i>Smith passed.</i>
<u>pertain</u>	Be in effect or existence in a specified place or at a specified time. <i>My remark pertained to your earlier comments.</i>
pertain to	Be relevant to.
point out	Repair the joints of bricks.
raise	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. <i>Raise the roof.</i>

<u>allusion</u>	The practice of making allusions. <i>An allusion to Shakespeare.</i>

declaim	Speak against in an impassioned manner. <i>A preacher declaiming from the pulpit.</i>
<u>denote</u>	Have as a meaning. <i>Her smile denoted that she agreed.</i>
<u>descriptive</u>	Of or relating to an approach to linguistic analysis that aims at the description of a language's forms, structures and usage. <i>The text contains some good descriptive passages.</i>
enunciation	The articulation of speech regarded from the point of view of its intelligibility to the audience.
fact	Information used as evidence or as part of a report or news article. <i>Even the most inventive journalism peters out without facts and in this case there were no facts.</i>

<u>foregoing</u>	Just mentioned or stated; preceding. <i>The foregoing analysis of the economic class structure.</i>
<u>imply</u>	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.</i>
impute	Attribute or credit to. <i>Christ s righteousness has been imputed to us.</i>
<u>maxim</u>	A short, pithy statement expressing a general truth or rule of conduct. <i>The maxim that actions speak louder than words.</i>
mention	An instance of being mentioned in dispatches. <i>Two other points are worthy of mention.</i>
notation	A note or annotation. <i>He noticed the notations in the margin.</i>
note	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>She noted that someone was following her.</i>
<u>observe</u>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>She observed that all the chairs were already occupied.</i>
ostensive	Directly demonstrative.
quotation	The action of quoting from a text, speech, piece of music, or work of art. <i>Ensure you receive a written quotation covering all aspects of the job.</i>

reference	Provide (a book or article) with citations of sources of information. <i>References to Darwinism and evolution.</i>
remark	Explicit notice. <i>It passed without remark.</i>
<u>specify</u>	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>The agency failed to specify that the workers were not their employees.</i>
