<b><u>imply</u></b>	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>impute</b>	Attribute or credit to. <i>Christ s righteousness has been <b>imputed</b> to us.</i>
<b><u>maxim</u></b>	A short, pithy statement expressing a general truth or rule of conduct. <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>mention</b>	An instance of being mentioned in dispatches. <i>Two other points are worthy of <b>mention</b>.</i>
<b>notation</b>	A note or annotation. <i>He noticed the <b>notations</b> in the margin.</i>
<b>note</b>	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>She <b>noted</b> that someone was following her.</i>

<b>reference</b>	Provide (a book or article) with citations of sources of information. <i><b>References</b> to Darwinism and evolution.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Explicit notice. <i>It passed without <b>remark</b>.</i>
