Synonyms of "Refurbish" as a verb (14 Words)

develop	Cause to grow and differentiate in ways conforming to its natural development. <i>The country developed into a mighty superpower.</i>
freshen up	Make (to feel) fresh.
make over	Institute, enact, or establish.
<u>overhaul</u>	Travel past. <i>The steering box was recently overhauled.</i>
<u>rebuild</u>	Build (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed. <i>We try to help them rebuild their lives.</i>
recondition	Bring into an improved condition. <i>It was necessary to recondition the human mind to accept change.</i>
<u>reconstruct</u>	Do over, as of (part of) a house. <i>Later emperors reconstructed the army.</i>

redevelop	Develop for a second time, in order to improve the contrast, colour, etc., of a negative or print. <i>The technology was redeveloped during the crusades.</i>
rehabilitate	Help to readapt, as to a former state of health or good repute. <i>With the fall of the government many former dissidents were rehabilitated.</i>
remodel	Shape (a figure or object) again or differently. <i>The station was remodelled and enlarged in 1927.</i>
renew	Repeat (a statement). <i>We renewed our friendship after a hiatus of twenty years.</i>
renovate	Give new life or energy to. <i>A little warm nourishment renovated him for a short time.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The government restored confidence in the housing market.</i>
revamp	Give new and improved form, structure, or appearance to. <i>Revamp my old boots.</i>



Usage Examples of "Refurbish" as a verb

- *The premises have been completely refurbished in our corporate style.*
- *We refurbished the guest wing.*

To make better.
*The reform did much to **ameliorate** living standards.*

boost

Give a boost to be beneficial to.
*He gave her a **boost** over the fence.*

develop

Cause to grow and differentiate in ways conforming to its natural development.
*Many countries in Asia are now **developing** at a very fast pace.*

<u>elevate</u>	(of a priest) hold up (a consecrated host or chalice) for adoration. <i>She ordered the bishop celebrating Mass in her chapel not to elevate the Host.</i>
enhance	Intensify, increase, or further improve the quality, value, or extent of. <i>This sauce will enhance the flavor of the meat.</i>
<u>escalate</u>	Increase in extent or intensity. <i>The Allies escalated the bombing.</i>
excision	Surgical removal of a body part or tissue. <i>The excision of the carcinoma.</i>
furtherance	The advancement of some enterprise. <i>The court held that the union's acts were not in furtherance of a trade dispute.</i>
help	Give help or assistance be of service. <i>She helped herself to a biscuit.</i>
improve	Develop or increase in mental capacity by education or experience. <i>I subscribed to two magazines to improve my mind.</i>
<u>industrialization</u>	The development of industries in a country or region on a wide scale. <i>These developing countries have undergone rapid industrialization.</i>
innovation	The act of starting something for the first time; introducing something new. <i>Innovation is crucial to the continuing success of any organization.</i>
lift	Lifting device consisting of a platform or cage that is raised and lowered mechanically in a vertical shaft in order to move people from one floor to another in a building. <i>We heard inspiring talks which lifted our spirits.</i>
<u>modernize</u>	Make repairs, renovations, revisions or adjustments to. <i>He modernized the health service.</i>
promote	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>They were promoted from the Third Division last season.</i>
protestant	The Protestant churches and denominations collectively.
<u>rebuild</u>	An instance of rebuilding. <i>The rebuilts include a number of Delage cars.</i>
reclaim	The action or process of reclaiming or being reclaimed. <i>Allow a week or ten days for reclaiming the bird.</i>
<u>reconstruction</u>	A thing that has been rebuilt after being damaged or destroyed. <i>Comparison between the original and the reconstruction.</i>

reestablish	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i>Reestablish peace in the region.</i>
<u>reform</u>	The action or process of reforming an institution or practice. <i>Reform a political system.</i>
<u>reformation</u>	A 16th-century movement for the reform of abuses in the Roman Church ending in the establishment of the Reformed and Protestant Churches. <i>The reformation of the Senate.</i>
<u>regenerate</u>	Bring, lead, or force to abandon a wrong or evil course of life, conduct, and adopt a right one. <i>Methods were developed to regenerate the cellulose for use as fibres.</i>
<u>reinstate</u>	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not reinstated.</i>
<u>renew</u>	Repeat (a statement). <i>The two renewed their friendship not having seen one another for five years.</i>
renovate	Give new life or energy to. <i>A little warm nourishment renovated him for a short time.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The government will restore land to those who lost it through confiscation.</i>
sophisticate	Make someone or something more sophisticated. <i>A sophisticated design.</i>
<u>upgrade</u>	To improve what was old or outdated. <i>The company upgraded their personnel.</i>
vivify	Give new life or energy to. <i>His remarks always vivify an otherwise dull story.</i>
