Regain as a Verb

Definitions of "Regain" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “regain” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Obtain possession or use of (something, typically a quality or ability) again after losing it.*
- *Reach (a place, position, or thing) again; get back to.*
- *Get or find back; recover the use of.*
- *Come upon after searching; find the location of something that was missed or lost.*

Synonyms of "Regain" as a verb (18 Words)

be reunited with	Be identical or equivalent to.
find	Come upon after searching find the location of something that was missed or lost. <i>I cannot find my gloves.</i>
find one's way back to	Establish after a calculation, investigation, experiment, survey, or study.
get back	Apprehend and reproduce accurately.

get back to	Succeed in catching or seizing, especially after a chase.
have something returned	Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).
reach again	Move forward or upward in order to touch; also in a metaphorical sense.
reattain	Attain (an objective or position) again. <i>A point is reached where stability is reattained.</i>
reclaim	Bring, lead, or force to abandon a wrong or evil course of life, conduct, and adopt a right one. <i>The people reclaimed the marshes.</i>
recoup	Regain or make up for. <i>He s just resting recouping from the trial.</i>
recover	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Many companies recovered their costs within six months.</i>
rejoin	Join again. <i>The soldiers were returning from leave to rejoin their unit.</i>
repossess	Claim back. <i>565 homes were repossessed for non payment of mortgages.</i>
rescue	Take forcibly from legal custody. <i>Firemen rescued a man trapped in the river.</i>
retrieve	Go for and bring back. <i>The police hope to encourage him to retrieve forgotten memories.</i>
return to	Return to a previous position in mathematics.
<u>salvage</u>	Save from ruin, destruction, or harm. <i>It was the only crumb of comfort he could salvage from the ordeal.</i>
win back	Attain success or reach a desired goal.

Usage Examples of "Regain" as a verb

- *He soon regained his composure.*
- *They were unable to regain their boats.*
- *She regained control of herself.*

acquire	Win something through one's efforts. <i>You must acquire the rudiments of Greek.</i>

acquirement	The action of acquiring something. <i>The acquirement of self control.</i>
acquisition	The cognitive process of acquiring skill or knowledge. <i>The company intends to grow within itself rather than by acquisition.</i>
again	Another time; once more. <i>She tried again.</i>
attainable	Able to be attained; achievable. <i>An attainable target.</i>
come	Come from be connected by a relationship of blood for example. <i>He had come to realize she was no puppet.</i>
convalesce	Get over an illness or shock. <i>He spent eight months convalescing after the stroke.</i>
convalescence	Time spent recovering from an illness or medical treatment; recuperation. <i>I had a long convalescence ahead.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Her childish behavior really get to me.</i>
have	Have put someone at a disadvantage in an argument. <i>An increasing gap between the haves and have nots.</i>
incur	Become subject to (something unwelcome or unpleasant) as a result of one's own behaviour or actions. <i>People who smoke incur a great danger to their health.</i>
obtain	Be valid, applicable, or true. <i>How did you obtain the visa.</i>
own	Have something as one's own possess. <i>She owned to a feeling of profound jealousy.</i>
possession	A territory that is controlled by a ruling state. <i>Fear took possession of my soul.</i>
procure	Obtain (something), especially with care or effort. <i>He persuaded a friend to procure him a ticket.</i>
procurement	The action of obtaining or procuring something. <i>He was responsible for the procurement of materials and supplies.</i>
recoup	Reimburse or compensate (someone), as for a loss. <i>Oil companies are keen to recoup their investment.</i>
recover	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>We expect the stocks to recover to 2 90.</i>

recovery	(in rowing, cycling, or swimming) the action of returning the paddle, leg, or arm to its initial position ready to make a new stroke. <i>The brace is used as a recovery stroke to avoid capsize.</i>
<u>recuperate</u>	Regain or make up for. <i>Recuperate one's losses.</i>
<u>reinstate</u>	Restore to the previous state or rank. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not reinstated.</i>
<u>rejuvenate</u>	Become young again. <i>The old man rejuvenated when he became a grandfather.</i>
reproduce	Make a copy or equivalent of. <i>Bacteria normally divide and reproduce themselves every twenty minutes.</i>
resilience	The capacity to recover quickly from difficulties; toughness. <i>Nylon is excellent in wearability abrasion resistance and resilience.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Restore law and order.</i>
retrieval	The operation of accessing information from the computer's memory. <i>Storage and retrieval systems.</i>
retrieve	Recall knowledge from memory; have a recollection. <i>The police hope to encourage him to retrieve forgotten memories.</i>
<u>revitalize</u>	Restore strength. <i>A package of spending cuts to revitalize the economy.</i>
revive	Restore interest in or the popularity of. <i>The paper made panicky attempts to revive falling sales.</i>
wangle	Achieve something by means of trickery or devious methods. <i>I wangled an invitation to her party.</i>
