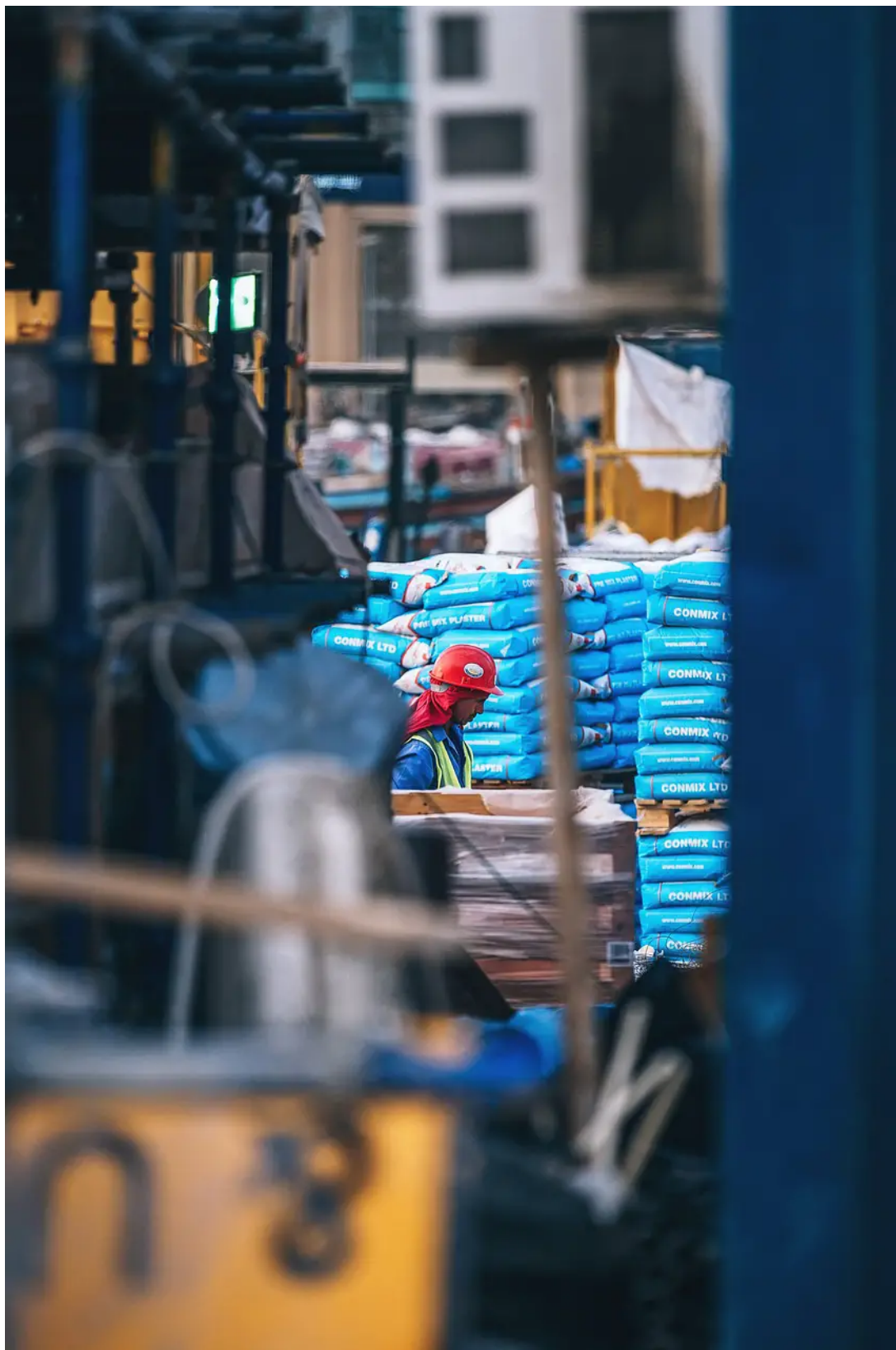
## Regenerate as a Verb

### Definitions of "Regenerate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “regenerate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of an organ or tissue) grow again.*
- *(especially in Christian use) give a new and higher spiritual nature to.*
- *Bring, lead, or force to abandon a wrong or evil course of life, conduct, and adopt a right one.*
- *Bring new and more vigorous life to (an area, industry, institution, etc.); revive, especially in economic terms.*
- *(of a living organism) grow (new tissue) after loss or damage.*
- *Precipitate (a natural polymer, especially cellulose or a protein) as fibres following chemical processing.*
- *Form or produce anew.*
- *Bring into renewed existence; generate again.*
- *Undergo regeneration.*
- *Replace (tissue or a body part) through the formation of new tissue.*
- *Restore strength.*
- *Return to life; get or give new life or energy.*

- *Reestablish on a new, usually improved, basis or make new or like new.*
- *Be formed or shaped anew.*
- *Amplify (an electron current) by causing part of the power in the output circuit to act upon the input circuit.*

<b>rectify</b>	Reduce to a fine, unmixed, or pure state; separate from extraneous matter or cleanse from impurities. <i><b>Rectify</b> alternating current.</i>
<a href="#">reform</a>	Subject (hydrocarbons) to a catalytic process in which straight-chain molecules are converted to branched forms for use as petrol. <i>The lazy student promised to <b>reform</b>.</i>
<a href="#">rejuvenate</a>	Return to life; get or give new life or energy. <i>The land <b>rejuvenated</b>.</i>
<b>rekindle</b>	Kindle anew, as of a fire. <i>He tried to <b>rekindle</b> their friendship.</i>
<a href="#">renew</a>	Extend the period of validity of (a licence, subscription, contract, etc). <i>The parents <b>renewed</b> their campaign to save the school.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The effort to <b>restore</b> him to office isn't working.</i>
<b>resuscitate</b>	Return to consciousness. <i>An ambulance crew tried to <b>resuscitate</b> him.</i>
<a href="#">revitalize</a>	Give new life or vigor to. <i>This food <b>revitalized</b> the patient.</i>

<b>revive</b>	Cause to regain consciousness. <i>Interest in ESP <b>revived</b>.</i>
<b>revivify</b>	Give new life or energy to. <i>They <b>revivified</b> a wine industry that had all but vanished.</i>
<b><u>uplift</u></b>	Raise up (strata, mountains, etc.) by an upward movement of the earth's crust. <i>The mountains were <b>uplifted</b> during the Jurassic period.</i>

<b><u>rejuvenate</u></b>	Return to life; get or give new life or energy. <i>A new challenge may be just what he needs to <b>rejuvenate</b> his career.</i>
<b>rejuvenation</b>	The action or process of giving new energy or vigour to something. <i>Experts in the art of facial <b>rejuvenation</b>.</i>
<b><u>renew</u></b>	Resume (an activity) after an interruption. <i>We <b>renewed</b> our friendship after a hiatus of twenty years.</i>
<b>renewal</b>	The act of renewing. <i>The call to continual spiritual <b>renewal</b>.</i>
<b>renovate</b>	Restore to a previous or better condition. <i>They <b>renovated</b> the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel.</i>

<b><u>replenish</u></b>	Fill something that had previously been emptied. <i>All creatures need sleep to <b>replenish</b> their energies.</i>
<b>reproduce</b>	Have offspring or produce more individuals of a given animal or plant. <i>His works are <b>reproduced</b> on postcards and posters.</i>
<b>resilience</b>	The physical property of a material that can return to its original shape or position after deformation that does not exceed its elastic limit. <i>The often remarkable <b>resilience</b> of so many British institutions.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> looked exactly like the original.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The week at the spa <b>restored</b> me.</i>
<b>resurge</b>	Rise again. <i>His need for a meal <b>resurged</b>.</i>
