Regenerate as a Verb

Definitions of "Regenerate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “regenerate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of an organ or tissue) grow again.*
- *(especially in Christian use) give a new and higher spiritual nature to.*
- *Bring, lead, or force to abandon a wrong or evil course of life, conduct, and adopt a right one.*
- *Bring new and more vigorous life to (an area, industry, institution, etc.); revive, especially in economic terms.*
- *(of a living organism) grow (new tissue) after loss or damage.*
- *Precipitate (a natural polymer, especially cellulose or a protein) as fibres following chemical processing.*
- *Form or produce anew.*
- *Bring into renewed existence; generate again.*
- *Undergo regeneration.*
- *Replace (tissue or a body part) through the formation of new tissue.*
- *Restore strength.*
- *Return to life; get or give new life or energy.*

- *Reestablish on a new, usually improved, basis or make new or like new.*
- *Be formed or shaped anew.*
- *Amplify (an electron current) by causing part of the power in the output circuit to act upon the input circuit.*

breathe new life into	Be alive.
change radically	Undergo a change; become different in essence; losing one's or its original nature.
improve	Get better. <i>Efforts to improve relations between the countries.</i>
kick-start	Start a motorcycle by means of a kick starter.
reanimate	Give new life or energy to. <i>His personal dislike of the man was reanimated.</i>
reawaken	Awaken once again. <i>His departure reawakened deep divisions within the party.</i>
reclaim	Make useful again; transform from a useless or uncultivated state. <i>Reclaim falcons.</i>
rectify	Reduce to a fine, unmixed, or pure state; separate from extraneous matter or cleanse from impurities. <i>Rectify alternating current.</i>
reform	Subject (hydrocarbons) to a catalytic process in which straight-chain molecules are converted to branched forms for use as petrol. <i>The lazy student promised to reform.</i>
rejuvenate	Return to life; get or give new life or energy. <i>The land rejuvenated.</i>
rekindle	Kindle anew, as of a fire. <i>He tried to rekindle their friendship.</i>
renew	Extend the period of validity of (a licence, subscription, contract, etc). <i>The parents renewed their campaign to save the school.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The effort to restore him to office isn't working.</i>
resuscitate	Return to consciousness. <i>An ambulance crew tried to resuscitate him.</i>
revitalize	Give new life or vigor to. <i>This food revitalized the patient.</i>

revive	Cause to regain consciousness. <i>Interest in ESP revived.</i>
revivify	Give new life or energy to. <i>They revivified a wine industry that had all but vanished.</i>
<u>uplift</u>	Raise up (strata, mountains, etc.) by an upward movement of the earth's crust. <i>The mountains were uplifted during the Jurassic period.</i>

<u>rejuvenate</u>	Return to life; get or give new life or energy. <i>A new challenge may be just what he needs to rejuvenate his career.</i>
rejuvenation	The action or process of giving new energy or vigour to something. <i>Experts in the art of facial rejuvenation.</i>
<u>renew</u>	Resume (an activity) after an interruption. <i>We renewed our friendship after a hiatus of twenty years.</i>
renewal	The act of renewing. <i>The call to continual spiritual renewal.</i>
renovate	Restore to a previous or better condition. <i>They renovated the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel.</i>

replenish	Fill something that had previously been emptied. <i>All creatures need sleep to replenish their energies.</i>
reproduce	Have offspring or produce more individuals of a given animal or plant. <i>His works are reproduced on postcards and posters.</i>
resilience	The physical property of a material that can return to its original shape or position after deformation that does not exceed its elastic limit. <i>The often remarkable resilience of so many British institutions.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration looked exactly like the original.</i>
