## Reincarnation as a Noun

### Definitions of "Reincarnation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “reincarnation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The Hindu or Buddhist doctrine that a person may be reborn successively into one of five classes of living beings (god or human or animal or hungry ghost or denizen of Hell) depending on the person's own actions.*
- *The rebirth of a soul in another body.*
- *A second or new birth.*
- *A person or animal in whom a particular soul is believed to have been reborn.*
- *A new version of something from the past.*
- *Embodiment in a new form (especially the reappearance or a person in another form).*



## Synonyms of "Reincarnation" as a noun (4 Words)

### **metempsychosis**

After death the soul begins a new cycle of existence in another human body.

*Like Eliot he has an interest in **metempsychosis**.*

### **rebirth**

The process of being reincarnated or born again.

*The endless cycle of birth death and **rebirth**.*

### **renascence**

A second or new birth.

*The **renascence** of poetry as an oral art.*

**transmigration of the soul** A human being.



## Usage Examples of "Reincarnation" as a noun

- *His reincarnation as a lion.*
- *The latest reincarnation of the hippie look.*
- *He believed he was the reincarnation of Louis XVI.*





## Associations of "Reincarnation" (30 Words)

**ascension**

A movement upward.  
*His **ascension** to the presidency.*

**disbelieve**

Be unable to believe.  
*To **disbelieve** is as much an act of faith as belief.*

**heaven**

A state of being eternally in the presence of God after death.  
*Galileo used a telescope to observe the **heavens**.*

**inanimate**

Showing no sign of life; lifeless.  
*The **inorganic** world is **inanimate**.*

<b><u>karma</u></b>	The effects of a person's actions that determine his destiny in his next incarnation.
<b>metempsychosis</b>	The supposed transmigration at death of the soul of a human being or animal into a new body of the same or a different species. <i>Like Eliot he has an interest in <b>metempsychosis</b>.</i>
<b>nirvana</b>	(in Buddhism) a transcendent state in which there is neither suffering, desire, nor sense of self, and the subject is released from the effects of karma and the cycle of death and rebirth. It represents the final goal of Buddhism. <i>The days of socialist <b>nirvana</b> in Europe are over.</i>
<b><u>paradise</u></b>	The abode of Adam and Eve before the Fall in the biblical account of the Creation; the Garden of Eden. <i>The surrounding countryside is a walker's <b>paradise</b>.</i>
<b>reanimate</b>	Restore to life or consciousness; revive. <i>His personal dislike of the man was <b>reanimated</b>.</i>
<b><u>rebirth</u></b>	The process of being reincarnated or born again. <i>The endless cycle of birth death and <b>rebirth</b>.</i>
<b>recover</b>	Get or find back recover the use of. <i><b>Recover</b> a chair.</i>
<b><u>recreate</u></b>	Create anew. <i>The students all <b>recreate</b> alike.</i>
<b>refresh</b>	Refresh one's memory. <i><b>Refresh</b> the screen frequently to make mistakes easier to identify.</i>
<b><u>rejuvenate</u></b>	Restore a youthful appearance to. <i>The land <b>rejuvenated</b>.</i>
<b><u>renaissance</u></b>	The revival of learning and culture.
<b>renewal</b>	(among charismatic Christians) the state or process of being made spiritually new in the Holy Spirit. <i>The need for urban <b>renewal</b>.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> looked exactly like the original.</i>
<b>resurge</b>	Rise again. <i>His need for a meal <b>resurged</b>.</i>
<b><u>resurgence</u></b>	Bringing again into activity and prominence. <i>A <b>resurgence</b> of interest in religion.</i>
<b><u>resurrect</u></b>	Restore (a dead person) to life. <i>He queried whether Jesus was indeed <b>resurrected</b>.</i>

<b>resuscitate</b>	Return to consciousness. <i>Measures to <b>resuscitate</b> the ailing economy.</i>
<b>resuscitated</b>	Restored to life or consciousness.
<b>resuscitation</b>	The act of reviving a person and returning them to consciousness. <i>Mouth to mouth <b>resuscitation</b>.</i>
<b><u>revitalize</u></b>	Imbue (something) with new life and vitality. <i>A package of spending cuts to <b>revitalize</b> the economy.</i>
<b><u>revival</u></b>	A restoration to life or consciousness. <i>Cross country skiing is enjoying a <b>revival</b>.</i>
<b>revive</b>	Restore from a depressed, inactive, or unused state. <i>He <b>revived</b> this style of opera.</i>
<b>soul</b>	The essence or embodiment of a specified quality. <i>Brevity is the <b>soul</b> of wit.</i>
<b>vim</b>	Energy; enthusiasm. <i>In his youth he was full of <b>vim</b> and vigour.</i>
<b><u>vitality</u></b>	The power giving continuance of life, present in all living things. <i>The <b>vitality</b> of seeds.</i>
<b>vivify</b>	Make more striking or animated. <i>Outings <b>vivify</b> learning for children.</i>
