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Associations of "Rejecting" (30 Words)

abnegation	Self-denial. <i>Abnegation of the Holy Trinity.</i>
<u>adamant</u>	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason. <i>He is adamant that he is not going to resign.</i>
apophasis	Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.
controvert	Argue about (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory controverted these results.</i>
deniable	Able to be denied. <i>The government did agree to play a limited and deniable role in the rebellion.</i>
<u>denial</u>	A defense mechanism that denies painful thoughts. <i>I was an addict in denial.</i>
<u>deny</u>	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>Both firms deny any responsibility for the tragedy.</i>
disapprobation	An expression of strong disapproval; pronouncing as wrong or morally culpable. <i>She braved her mother's disapprobation and slipped out to enjoy herself.</i>
<u>disapproval</u>	The expression of disapproval. <i>Jill replied with a hint of disapproval in her voice.</i>
<u>disavow</u>	Refuse to acknowledge; disclaim knowledge of; responsibility for, or association with. <i>The union leaders resisted pressure to disavow picket line violence.</i>
disavowal	Denial of any connection with or knowledge of. <i>They know this despite their disavowals.</i>
disclaim	Make a disclaimer about. <i>The school disclaimed any responsibility for his death.</i>

inadmissible	Not to be allowed or tolerated. <i>He held that such evidence was inadmissible.</i>
negate	Deny the truth of. <i>This action will negate the effect of my efforts.</i>
no	Quantifier used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of. <i>We have no bananas.</i>
nullify	Show to be invalid. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
objection	An expression or feeling of disapproval or opposition; a reason for disagreeing. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
ostracism	Exclusion from a society or group. <i>The ostracism of Thucydides.</i>
rebuff	Force or drive back. <i>Rebuff the attack.</i>
refusal	An instance of a horse stopping short or running aside at a jump. <i>He became tired of his friend s refusal to see him.</i>
refuse	Refuse entrance or membership. <i>The car refused to start.</i>
refutable	Able to be refuted.
refute	Deny or contradict (a statement or accusation). <i>A spokesman totally refuted the allegation of bias.</i>
rejection	(medicine) an immunological response that refuses to accept substances or organisms that are recognized as foreign. <i>His proposals were met with rejection.</i>
renunciation	An act (spoken or written) declaring that something is surrendered or disowned. <i>The life of the Spirit required renunciation of marriage.</i>
repudiate	Refuse to accept; reject. <i>Philip was excommunicated in 1095 because he had repudiated his wife.</i>
repudiation	Rejection of a proposal or idea. <i>The repudiation of the debt by the city.</i>
resist	Stand up or offer resistance to somebody or something. <i>The trees resisted her.</i>
spurn	An act of spurning. <i>With one touch of my feet I spurn the solid Earth.</i>

veto

A rejection by right of veto.
