
### **Rejuvenate as a Verb**

#### Definitions of "Rejuvenate" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "rejuvenate" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Make younger or more youthful.
- Develop youthful topographical features.
- Return to life; get or give new life or energy.
- Restore a youthful appearance to.
- *Give new energy or vigour to; revitalize.*
- Restore (a river or stream) to a condition characteristic of a younger landscape.
- Become young again.
- Cause (a stream or river) to erode, as by an uplift of the land.

<u>renew</u>	Replace (something that is broken or worn out. <i>He announced that he did not intend to <b>renew</b> the peace talks.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. The government <b>restore</b> d confidence in the housing market.
resuscitate	Return to consciousness. Measures to <b>resuscitate</b> the ailing economy.
<u>revitalize</u>	Give new life or vigor to. This food <b>revitalize</b> d the patient.
revive	Restore from a depressed, inactive, or unused state. She <b>revive</b> d after the doctor gave her an injection.
revivify	Give new life or vigour to. They revivified a wine industry that had all but vanished.
<u>uplift</u>	Pick up or take away. Mona says the orchestra has <b>uplift</b> ed her quality of life.

renovate	Restore (something old, especially a building) to a good state of repair. This will <b>renovate</b> my spirits.
resilience	An occurrence of rebounding or springing back. The often remarkable <b>resilience</b> of so many British institutions.
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The building has been lovingly</i> <b>restore</b> d.
