associate	Keep company with; hang out with. <i>He began to associate with the Mafia.</i>
bear on	Support or hold in a certain manner.
colligate	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>Colligate these facts.</i>
come to	Come to one's mind suggest itself.
concern	Have a specific connection with or responsibility for. <i>The roof of the barn concerns me because eventually it will fall in.</i>
connect	Connect fasten or put together two or more pieces. <i>The brick connected on her head knocking her out.</i>
have to do with	Receive willingly something given or offered.
interrelate	Relate or connect to one another. <i>I cannot interrelate these two events.</i>

link	Create a hyperlink between web pages or hypertext documents. <i>She linked up with an artistic group.</i>
link up	Link with or as with a yoke.
	Be a part or attribute of.
pertain	<i>Their economic circumstances are vastly different from those which pertained in their land of origin.</i>
	Make reference to.
refer	<i>Refer a patient to a specialist.</i>
tie in	Form a knot or bow in.
touch	Consume or use (food, drink, money, etc). <i>The dog had one paw outstretched not quite touching the ground.</i>
touch on	Comprehend.

allied	Related by common characteristics or ancestry. <i>Allied studies.</i>
appertain	Be a part or attribute of. <i>The institutional arrangements which appertain under the system.</i>
appropriate	Suitable for a particular person or place or condition etc. <i>It seems that an apology is appropriate.</i>
associate	A person who joins with others in some activity or endeavor. <i>A close associate of the Minister.</i>
<u>bearing</u>	Characteristic way of bearing one's body. <i>There were no steeples or bridges from which to take a bearing.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>A new product which combines the benefits of a hairspray and a gel.</i>
congruity	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.

conjoin	Join; combine. <i>An approach which conjoins theory and method.</i>
connect	Connect fasten or put together two or more pieces. <i>All the buildings are connected by underground passages.</i>
connection	A supplier (especially of narcotics). <i>The connections between social attitudes and productivity.</i>
<u>correlate</u>	Establish a mutual relationship or connection between. <i>Do these facts correlate.</i>
correlation	A statistic representing how closely two variables co vary it can vary from 1 perfect negative correlation through 0 no correlation to 1 perfect positive correlation. <i>What is the correlation between those two variables.</i>
correlative	Having a mutual relationship; corresponding. <i>The child s right to education is a correlative of the parent s duty to send the child to school.</i>
factually	With regard to what is actually the case; in relation to fact. <i>His assertion is factually incorrect.</i>
<u>friendship</u>	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>This is an ideal group for finding support and friendship.</i>
germane	Relevant and appropriate. <i>He asks questions that are germane and central to the issue.</i>
included	Enclosed in the same envelope or package. <i>All of Europe Britain included.</i>
interrelationship	Mutual or reciprocal relation or relatedness. <i>The interrelationship between the comprehension and production of early vocabulary.</i>
<u>link</u>	Create a hyperlink between web pages or hypertext documents. <i>Sign language interpreters represent a vital link between the deaf and hearing communities.</i>
linked	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
<u>pertain</u>	Be appropriate, related, or applicable to. <i>The shop premises and stock and all assets pertaining to the business.</i>
pertinence	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
pertinent	Relevant or applicable to a particular matter; apposite. <i>She asked me a lot of very pertinent questions.</i>

proper	Denoting something that is truly what it is said or regarded to be; genuine. <i>Her parents view of what was proper for a well bred girl.</i>
referent	Something that refers; a term that refers to another term. <i>The Morning Star and the Evening Star have the same referent the planet Venus.</i>
related	Associated with the specified item or process, especially causally. <i>Sleeping sickness and related diseases.</i>
relation	The action of telling a story. <i>He has distant relations back in New Jersey.</i>
<u>relevance</u>	The relation of something to the matter at hand. <i>This film has contemporary relevance.</i>
relevancy	The relation of something to the matter at hand.
socialize	Prepare for social life. <i>Newcomers are socialized into orthodox ways.</i>
