#### Definitions of "Relay" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "relay" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- An electrical device, typically incorporating an electromagnet, which is activated by a current or signal in one circuit to open or close another circuit.
- A race between teams; each member runs or swims part of the distance.
- A race between teams of runners, each team member in turn covering part of the total distance.
- A device to receive, reinforce, and retransmit a radio or television signal.
- A signal or broadcast transmitted by a relay.
- A fresh team to relieve weary draft animals.
- A crew of workers who relieve another crew.
- Electrical device such that current flowing through it in one circuit can switch on and



off a current in a second circuit.


- The act of passing something along from one person or group to another.
- A group of people or animals engaged in a task or activity for a period of time and then replaced by a similar group.

broadcast	A radio or television show. The Queen s annual Christmas TV <b>broadcast</b> .
communication	Means of travelling or of transporting goods, such as roads or railways. <i>Television is an effective means of communication</i> .
feed	An actor who gives a feed to a fellow performer. A paper <b>feed</b> .
programme	A performance (or series of performances) at a public presentation. <i>The British nuclear power <b>programme</b></i> .
relay race	The act of passing something along from one person or group to another.
show	A play or other stage performance, especially a musical. A <b>show</b> of impatience.
telecast	A television broadcast.
transmission	Communication by means of transmitted signals. The <b>transmission</b> of the virus.

- A 550-metre relay race.




**Relay as a Verb** 



#### Definitions of "Relay" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "relay" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Pass along.
- Broadcast (something) by passing signals received from elsewhere through a transmitting station.
- Control or operate by relay.
- Receive and pass on (information or a message.



#### Synonyms of "Relay" as a verb (16 Words)

broadcast

Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. The second method is to **broadcast** the seeds together with not more than 1 kg to the acre of rapeseed.



<u>circulate</u>	Move around freely from person to person or from place to place. <i>Rumours of his arrest circulated</i> .
communicate	Receive Communion, in the Catholic church. Please <b>communicate</b> this message to all employees.
<u>disseminate</u>	Cause to become widely known. There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can <b>disseminate</b> and migrate.
feed	Feed into supply. I could <b>feed</b> my melancholy by reading Romantic poetry.
hand on	Place into the hands or custody of.
<u>impart</u>	Make (information) known. <i>Impart</i> a new skill to the students.
make known	Create or design, often in a certain way.
pass on	Move past.
<u>publish</u>	Communicate (a libel) to a third party. We <b>publish</b> practical reference books.
<u>repeat</u>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>He <b>repeat</b>ed the words after me.</i>
retail	Sell goods to the public by retail. The difficulties in <b>retail</b> ing the new products.
send	Send a message or letter. <b>Send</b> your document as a PDF attachment.
spread	Become distributed or widespread. Volcanic eruptions <b>spread</b> dust high into the stratosphere.
transfer	Transfer somebody to a different position or location of work. A <b>transfer</b> red use of the Old English noun.
<u>transmit</u>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. The programme was <b>transmit</b> ted on 7 October.






## Usage Examples of "Relay" as a verb

- The speech was relayed live from the palace.
- Please relay the news to the villagers.
- She intended to relay everything she had learned.





# Associations of "Relay" (30 Words)

address	Write the name and address of the intended recipient on an envelope letter or parcel. I <b>address</b> ed my letter to him personally.
addressee	The person to whom something is addressed. The contents of the letters were calculated to cause distress to the individual <b>addressee</b> .
airmail	Send or transport by airmail. Letters to Europe from the US are best <b>airmail</b> ed.
<u>bulletin</u>	Make public by bulletin.
consignee	The person to whom merchandise is delivered over.
<u>convey</u>	Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere. Pipes were laid to <b>convey</b> water to the house.



<u>correspondence</u>	Communication by exchanging letters, emails, or other messages. There is a simple <b>correspondence</b> between the distance of a focused object from the eye and the size of its image on the retina.
courier	Send goods or documents by courier. A <b>courier</b> disguised as a commercial traveller.
delivery	The supply or provision of something. <i>His reluctant <b>delivery</b> of bad news.</i>
email	Send a message by email. You can <b>email</b> me at my normal address.
<u>envelope</u>	The maximum operating capability of a system (especially an aircraft. <i>The external envelope of the swimming pool.</i>
<u>interact</u>	Communicate or be involved directly. <i>All the stages in the process <b>interact</b>.</i>
mail	A single delivery or collection of mail. <i>You can order by <b>mail</b>.</i>
mailbox	A computer file in which email messages received by a particular user are stored.
mailing	Mail sent by a sender at one time. The postmark indicates the time of <b>mailing</b> .
medley	Make a medley of intermix. The 400 m individual <b>medley</b> .
message	Send a message to. Select an option to delete your mail <b>message</b> s.
<u>messenger</u>	Send a document or package by messenger. Could you have it <b>messenger</b> ed over to me.
post	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. Smith and Lamb <b>post</b> ed a century partnership.
postage	The sending of letters and parcels by post. Proof of <b>postage</b> is required.
postal	Of or relating to the system for delivering mail. <b>Postal</b> services.
postcard	A card for sending a message by post without an envelope, typically having a photograph or other illustration on one side. <i>He promised to send me a picture <b>postcard</b>.</i>
postmaster	The person in charge of a post office.
recipient	Receiving or capable of receiving something. The <b>recipient</b> of the Nobel Peace Prize.



<u>respond</u>	Respond favorably or as hoped. She <b>respond</b> ed to his grin with a smile.
send	Send a message or letter. It s the spectacle and music that <b>send</b> us not the words.
sender	A person who sends or transmits a message, letter, email, etc. <b>Sender</b> s of unwanted emails.
spam	Unwanted or intrusive advertising on the internet. An autogenerated <b>spam</b> website.
<u>transmit</u>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Transmit</i> a message.
transport	A convict who was transported to a penal colony. <i>The <b>transport</b> of crude oil.</i>
