### Definitions of "Relent" as a verb

- *Become less severe or intense.*
- *Give in, as to influence or pressure.*
- *Abandon or mitigate a severe or harsh attitude, especially by finally yielding to a request.*

### Synonyms of "Relent" as a verb (28 Words)

<b><a href="#">abate</a></b>	Make (something) less intense. <i>The storm <b>abated</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">accede</a></b>	Take on duties or office. <i>Elizabeth I <b>acceded</b> to the throne in 1558.</i>
<b>acquiesce</b>	Accept something reluctantly but without protest. <i>Sara <b>acquiesced</b> in his decision.</i>
<b>back down</b>	Shift to a counterclockwise direction.

<b>capitulate</b>	Surrender under agreed conditions. <i>The patriots had to <b>capitulate</b> to the enemy forces.</i>
<b>change one's mind</b>	Give to, and receive from, one another.
<b>come round</b>	Be found or available.
<b>decrease</b>	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He <b>decreased</b> his staff.</i>
<b>die down</b>	To be on base at the end of an inning, of a player.
<b>diminish</b>	Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of. <i>The new law is expected to <b>diminish</b> the government's chances.</i>
<b>do a u-turn</b>	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.
<b>drop</b>	Let or cause to fall in drops. <i>The Giants <b>dropped</b> 11 of their first 13.</i>
<u><b>ease</b></u>	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>International tension began to <b>ease</b>.</i>
<b>ease off</b>	Lessen the intensity of or calm.
<b>ease up</b>	Lessen pain or discomfort; alleviate.
<b>fall off</b>	Be inherited by.
<b>give in</b>	Place into the hands or custody of.
<b>give way</b>	Place into the hands or custody of.
<b>lessen</b>	Make smaller. <i>The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessened</b>.</i>
<b>let up</b>	Consent to, give permission.
<b>moderate</b>	Restrain. <i>John <b>moderated</b> the discussion.</i>
<b>relax</b>	Cause to feel relaxed. <i>He <b>relaxed</b> in the hot tub.</i>
<b>slacken</b>	Become looser or slack. <i>The rope <b>slackened</b>.</i>
<b>soften</b>	Lessen in force or effect. <i>Plant extracts to <b>soften</b> and moisturize the skin.</i>
<b>subside</b>	Wear off or die down. <i>Fergus opened his mouth to protest again then <b>subsided</b>.</i>
<b>tail off</b>	Go after with the intent to catch.
<u><b>weaken</b></u>	Reduce the level or intensity or size or scope of. <i>Fault lines had <b>weakened</b> and shattered the rocks.</i>

**yield** Produce or provide (a natural, agricultural, or industrial product).  
*The door **yielded** to repeated blows with a battering ram.*

## Usage Examples of "Relent" as a verb

- *She was going to refuse his request, but **relented**.*
- *The rain **relented**.*

## Associations of "Relent" (30 Words)

<b>allay</b>	Diminish or put at rest (fear, suspicion, or worry). <i>The report attempted to educate the public and <b>allay</b> fears.</i>
<b>alleviate</b>	Make (suffering, deficiency, or a problem) less severe. <i>He couldn't prevent her pain only <b>alleviate</b> it.</i>
<b>appease</b>	Overcome or allay. <i>We give to charity because it <b>appeases</b> our guilt.</i>
<b>assuage</b>	Satisfy (an appetite or desire). <i>An opportunity occurred to <b>assuage</b> her desire for knowledge.</i>
<b>buffer</b>	Add a buffer a solution. <i>Try <b>buffering</b> as much of the video stream as you can before you hit the play button.</i>
<b>conciliate</b>	Gain (esteem or goodwill). <i>Concessions were made to <b>conciliate</b> the peasantry.</i>
<b>demulcent</b>	A medication (in the form of an oil or salve etc.) that soothes inflamed or injured skin.
<b>drink</b>	Drink excessive amounts of alcohol be an alcoholic. <i>He jumped into the <b>drink</b> and had to be rescued.</i>
<b>ease</b>	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>A huge road building programme to <b>ease</b> congestion.</i>
<b>emollient</b>	Having a softening or soothing effect especially to the skin. <i>A rich <b>emollient</b> shampoo.</i>
<b>extenuate</b>	Cause (an offence) to seem less serious. <i>The circumstances <b>extenuate</b> the crime.</i>
<b>licensee</b>	Someone to whom a license is granted.
<b>maceration</b>	Softening due to soaking or steeping.
<b>mitigate</b>	Make less severe or harsh. <i>There had been a provocation that <b>mitigated</b> the offence to a degree.</i>

<b>mollify</b>	Appease the anger or anxiety of (someone). <i>She managed to <b>mollify</b> the angry customer.</i>
<b>pacify</b>	Bring peace to (a country or warring factions), especially by the use or threat of military force. <i>The U N troops are working to <b>pacify</b> Bosnia.</i>
<b>palliate</b>	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>This eliminated or at least <b>palliated</b> suspicions aroused by German unity.</i>
<b>persuade</b>	Cause somebody to adopt a certain position, belief, or course of action; twist somebody's arm. <i>Health boards were finally <b>persuaded</b> of the desirability of psychiatric units.</i>
<b>placate</b>	Make (someone) less angry or hostile. <i>They attempted to <b>placate</b> the students with promises.</i>
<b>propitiate</b>	Win or regain the favour of (a god, spirit, or person) by doing something that pleases them. <i>The pagans thought it was important to <b>propitiate</b> the gods with sacrifices.</i>
<b>quell</b>	Overcome or allay. <i>Connor <b>quelled</b> him with a look.</i>
<b>quench</b>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. <i>The cold water <b>quenched</b> his thirst.</i>
<b>rarefy</b>	Make or become less dense or solid. <i>As the shell continues to expand and <b>rarefy</b> astronomers may eventually be able to see characteristic gamma rays from the radioactivity within.</i>
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>He was <b>relieved</b> by her change of tone.</i>
<b>remit</b>	Law the act of remitting especially the referral of a law case to another court. <i>A <b>remit</b> on the question failed.</i>
<b>satisfy</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>Social services is trying to <b>satisfy</b> the needs of so many different groups.</i>
<b>slacken</b>	Make or become slack. <i>The pace never <b>slackens</b>.</i>
<b>slake</b>	Combine (quicklime) with water to produce calcium hydroxide. <i>Restaurants worked to <b>slake</b> the Italian obsession with food.</i>
<b>soften</b>	Give in, as to influence or pressure. <i>The share price has <b>softened</b> recently.</i>
<b>soothe</b>	Give moral or emotional strength to. <i>To <b>soothe</b> the skin try chamomile or thyme.</i>
