<b><u>fierce</u></b>	Having or displaying an intense or ferocious aggressiveness. <i>The tiger is the largest member of the cat family and a <b>fierce</b> predator.</i>
<b><u>grim</u></b>	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. <i>The <b>grim</b> aftermath of the bombing.</i>
<b>hard</b>	Unfortunate or hard to bear. <i>Efforts to turn psychology into <b>hard</b> science.</i>
<b>harsh</b>	Unpleasantly stern. <i>A <b>harsh</b> penalty.</i>
<b><u>heartless</u></b>	Displaying a complete lack of feeling or consideration. <i><b>Heartless</b> thieves stole the pushchair of a two year old boy.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The <b>incessant</b> beat of the music.</i>
<b>inexorable</b>	Impossible to stop or prevent. <i>Cynthia was <b>inexorable</b> she would have none of him.</i>
<b>interminable</b>	Endless or apparently endless (often used hyperbolically). <i>We got bogged down in <b>interminable</b> discussions.</i>
<b>lacking compassion</b>	Inadequate in amount or degree.
<b><u>lasting</u></b>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>A <b>lasting</b> relationship.</i>
<b><u>merciless</u></b>	Showing no mercy. <i>A <b>merciless</b> attack with a blunt instrument.</i>
<b>never-ending</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.

<b>perpetual</b>	Never ending or changing. <i>The <b>perpetual</b> struggle to maintain standards in a democracy.</i>
<b>persistent</b>	Never-ceasing. <i>An attempt to stop <b>persistent</b> drink drivers.</i>
<b>pitiless</b>	Deficient in humane and kindly feelings. <i>A <b>pitiless</b> executioner.</i>
<b><u>punishing</u></b>	Characterized by effort to the point of exhaustion; especially physical effort. <i>Set a <b>punishing</b> pace.</i>
<b>remorseless</b>	Without regret or guilt. <i>A monster of <b>remorseless</b> cruelty.</i>
<b><u>ruthless</u></b>	Having or showing no pity or compassion for others. <i>A <b>ruthless</b> manipulator.</i>
<b><u>severe</u></b>	Severely simple. <i>A <b>severe</b> attack of asthma.</i>
<b><u>steady</u></b>	Not faltering or wavering; controlled. <i>A <b>steady</b> breeze.</i>
<b>stern</b>	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. <i>A <b>stern</b> disciplinarian.</i>
<b>stony</b>	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i>Rough <b>stony</b> paths.</i>
<b>strict</b>	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i>A <b>strict</b> vegetarian.</i>
<b>sustained</b>	Maintained at length without interruption or weakening. <i>Several years of <b>sustained</b> economic growth.</i>
<b><u>unabated</u></b>	Without any reduction in intensity or strength. <i>The popularity of his books among young people continued <b>unabated</b>.</i>
<b>unabating</b>	Not weakening or losing intensity. <i><b>Unabating</b> enthusiasm.</i>
<b>unappeasable</b>	Not able to be pacified, placated, or satisfied. <i>Divine <b>unappeasable</b> justice.</i>
<b><u>unbroken</u></b>	Not broken, fractured, or damaged. <i>A night of sleep <b>unbroken</b> by nightmares.</i>
<b><u>uncaring</u></b>	Lacking affection or warm feeling. <i>An <b>uncaring</b> father.</i>

<b>unceasing</b>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>Man s <b>unceasing</b> warfare with drought and isolation.</i>
<b>uncharitable</b>	(of a person's behaviour or attitude towards others) unkind; unsympathetic. <i>This <b>uncharitable</b> remark possibly arose out of jealousy.</i>
<b>unending</b>	Having or seeming to have no end. <i>The charity rescues children from <b>unending</b> poverty.</i>
<b>unfeeling</b>	Lacking physical sensation or sensitivity. <i>An <b>unfeeling</b> wretch.</i>
<b>unforgiving</b>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>A surly <b>unforgiving</b> old woman.</i>
<b>uninterrupted</b>	(of a view) unobstructed. <i>The window gives an <b>uninterrupted</b> view of the mountains.</i>
<b>unmerciful</b>	Having or showing no mercy. <i>Deceptively inflated incomes expose many couples to <b>unmerciful</b> taxes.</i>
<b>unpitying</b>	Without mercy or pity. <i>A flat <b>unpitying</b> voice.</i>
<b>unrelenting</b>	Harsh. <i><b>Unrelenting</b> opponents.</i>
<b>unrelieved</b>	Not provided with relief; not aided or assisted. <i>Flowing gowns of <b>unrelieved</b> black.</i>
<b>unremitting</b>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. <i><b>Unremitting</b> drizzle.</i>
<b>unsparing</b>	Not forbearing; ruthless. <i>An <b>unsparing</b> critic.</i>
<b>unstoppable</b>	Impossible to stop or prevent. <i>An <b>unstoppable</b> left foot volley.</i>
<b>unsympathetic</b>	Not feeling, showing, or expressing sympathy. <i>A totally <b>unsympathetic</b> character.</i>

<b>endless</b>	Infinitely great in number. <i>We smoked <b>endless</b> cigarettes.</i>
<b>equable</b>	Not varying. <i>An <b>equable</b> temper.</i>
<b>hammering</b>	The action or sound of hammering something. <i>A 7 0 <b>hammering</b> by the league leaders.</i>
<b>harsh</b>	Cruel or severe. <i>She finds soap too <b>harsh</b> and drying.</i>
<b>implacable</b>	Unable to be appeased or placated. <i>He was an <b>implacable</b> enemy of Ted s.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The <b>incessant</b> beat of the music.</i>
<b>incessantly</b>	With unflagging resolve. <i>She talked about him <b>incessantly</b>.</i>
<b>inexorable</b>	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason- W.Churchill. <i>The doctors were <b>inexorable</b> and there was nothing to be done.</i>

<b><u>merciless</u></b>	Having or showing no mercy. A <b>merciless</b> attack with a blunt instrument.
<b><u>obsessive</u></b>	A person who has obsessions. He s an <b>obsessive</b> obsessed with having complete collections of things.
<b>persistent</b>	Continuing firmly or obstinately in an opinion or course of action in spite of difficulty or opposition. <b>Persistent</b> leaves remain attached past maturity.
<b>pitiless</b>	Deficient in humane and kindly feelings. A <b>pitiless</b> executioner.
<b>pummel</b>	Criticize severely. The pedestrians <b>pummeled</b> the demonstrators.
<b>remorseless</b>	Without mercy or pity. A monster of <b>remorseless</b> cruelty.
<b><u>ruthless</u></b>	Without mercy or pity. A <b>ruthless</b> manipulator.
<b><u>steady</u></b>	In a steady manner. I thought I d better get a <b>steady</b> job.
<b>stubborn</b>	Not responding to treatment. A <b>stubborn</b> refusal to learn from experience.
<b>tenacious</b>	Stubbornly unyielding. Men <b>tenacious</b> of opinion.
<b>unceasingly</b>	With unflagging resolve.
<b><u>unkind</u></b>	Lacking kindness. The <b>unkindest</b> cut of all.
<b><u>unrelenting</u></b>	Punishingly harsh. The heat was <b>unrelenting</b> .
