## Relevant as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Relevant" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “relevant” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Appropriate to the current time, period, or circumstances; of contemporary interest.*
- *Having a bearing on or connection with the subject at issue.*
- *Closely connected or appropriate to what is being done or considered.*



## Synonyms of "Relevant" as an adjective (7 Words)

- admissible** Deserving to be admitted.  
*Foreigners were **admissible** only as temporary workers.*
- applicable** Relevant or appropriate.  
*The same considerations are equally **applicable** to accident claims.*
- apposite** Being of striking appropriateness and pertinence.  
*The successful copywriter is a master of **apposite** and evocative verbal images.*
- apropos** Of an appropriate or pertinent nature.  
*The song feels **apropos** to a midnight jaunt.*
- germane** Relevant to a subject under consideration.  
*That is not **germane** to our theme.*
- material** Having material or physical form or substance Benjamin Jowett.  
*Information that could be **material** to a murder inquiry.*

**pertinent** Being of striking appropriateness and pertinence.  
*A list of articles **pertinent** to the discussion.*







## Usage Examples of "Relevant" as an adjective

- Critics may find themselves unable to stay relevant in a changing world.
- What small companies need is relevant advice.
- The candidate's experience is relevant to the job.
- Her films are relevant for feminists today.
- The scientist corresponds with colleagues in order to learn about matters relevant to her own research.

**acknowledgement** A statement acknowledging something or someone.  
*I received an **acknowledgement** of my application.*

**affordable** Inexpensive; reasonably priced.  
***Affordable** homes.*

<b>applicable</b>	Capable of being applied; having relevance. <i>The same considerations are equally <b>applicable</b> to accident claims.</i>
<b><u>apposite</u></b>	Apt in the circumstances or in relation to something. <i>The successful copywriter is a master of <b>apposite</b> and evocative verbal images.</i>
<b>appropriate</b>	Suitable for a particular person or place or condition etc. <i>A book not <b>appropriate</b> for children.</i>
<b><u>apropos</u></b>	Very appropriate to a particular situation. <i>The composer's reference to child's play is <b>apropos</b>.</i>
<b><u>apt</u></b>	Having a tendency to do something. <i>He is <b>apt</b> to ignore matters he considers unimportant.</i>
<b>befitting</b>	Appropriate to the occasion. <i>Behavior <b>befitting</b> a father.</i>
<b>congruous</b>	Suitable or appropriate together. <i>This explanation is <b>congruous</b> with earlier observations.</i>
<b>correct</b>	Socially right or correct. <i>He was a polite man invariably <b>correct</b> and pleasant with Mrs Collins.</i>
<b><u>corrective</u></b>	Designed to promote discipline. <i><b>Corrective</b> measures.</i>
<b>desirability</b>	The quality of being desirable. <i>We agree on the <b>desirability</b> of a negotiated settlement.</i>
<b>felicitous</b>	Pleasing and fortunate. <i>A <b>felicitous</b> life.</i>
<b>fit</b>	Make fit. <i>Well are you <b>fit</b>.</i>
<b>fitting</b>	Being precisely fitting and right. <i>The <b>fitting</b> of new engines by the shipyard.</i>
<b>germane</b>	Relevant to a subject under consideration. <i>That is not <b>germane</b> to our theme.</i>
<b>legitimate</b>	Show or affirm to be just and legitimate. <i>The regime was not <b>legitimated</b> by popular support.</i>
<b>licit</b>	Not forbidden; lawful. <i>Usage patterns differ between <b>licit</b> and <b>illicit</b> drugs.</i>
<b><u>opportune</u></b>	Done or occurring at a favourable time; well timed. <i>An <b>opportune</b> arrival.</i>
<b>pertinence</b>	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.

<b>pertinent</b>	Relevant or applicable to a particular matter; apposite. <i>A list of articles <b>pertinent</b> to the discussion.</i>
<b>proper</b>	Denoting a subset or subgroup that does not constitute the entire set or group, especially one that has more than one element. <i>The two elephant types <b>proper</b> to Africa and to southern Asia.</i>
<u>properly</u>	In the right manner. <i>If you don't behave <b>properly</b> you'll have to leave.</i>
<u>propriety</u>	The details or rules of behaviour conventionally considered to be correct. <i>He always behaved with the utmost <b>propriety</b>.</i>
<u>relevance</u>	The relation of something to the matter at hand. <i>The Web does allow us to produce more articles of <b>relevance</b> to our readers.</i>
<b>right</b>	A person's right fist especially a boxer's. <i>Things are <b>right</b> again now.</i>
<b>rightness</b>	Conformity to fact or truth. <i>The <b>rightness</b> of that move for me.</i>
<b>seemly</b>	Conforming to accepted notions of propriety or good taste; decorous. <i>I felt it was not <b>seemly</b> to observe too closely.</i>
<b>suit</b>	Slang a businessman dressed in a business suit. <i>A jogging <b>suit</b>.</i>
<u>suitable</u>	Meant or adapted for an occasion or use. <i>The parents found the girl <b>suitable</b> for their son.</i>
