credence in	A kind of sideboard or buffet.
<u>dependence</u>	The state of relying on or being controlled by someone or something else. <i>The</i> <b>dependence</b> of our medical schools on grant funds.
<u>dependency</u>	A geographical area politically controlled by a distant country. <i>The country s <b>dependency</b> on the oil industry.</i>
faith in	A strong belief in a supernatural power or powers that control human destiny.





## Associations of "Reliance" (30 Words)

alertness	The process of paying close and continuous attention. Walsall were indebted to the bravery and <b>alertness</b> of their goalkeeper.
believe	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. I <b>believe</b> that he will come back from the war.
centrality	The state of being accessible from a variety of places. The <b>centrality</b> of religion in their lives.
<u>confidant</u>	Someone to whom private matters are confided. A close <b>confidant</b> e of the princess.
credibility	The quality of being convincing or believable. <i>The government s loss of <b>credibility</b></i> .
<u>credible</u>	(a common but incorrect usage where `credulous' would be appropriate) credulous. A <b>credible</b> threat.



<u>credulity</u>	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. Moneylenders prey upon their <b>credulity</b> and inexperience.
depend	Be grammatically dependent on. A town which had <b>depend</b> ed heavily upon the wool industry.
<u>dependence</u>	Addiction to drink or drugs. The <b>dependence</b> of our medical schools on grant funds.
<u>endurance</u>	The capacity of something to last or to withstand wear and tear. <i>The annual 24 hour <b>endurance</b> race.</i>
<u>endure</u>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>The legend of Elvis <b>endure</b>s.</i>
forbear	Resist doing something. Rebecca could not <b>forbear</b> a smile.
fortitude	Courage in pain or adversity. She endured her illness with great <b>fortitude</b> .
indomitable	Impossible to subdue or defeat. A woman of <b>indomitable</b> spirit.
obstinacy	Resolute adherence to your own ideas or desires. <i>His reputation for <b>obstinacy</b>.</i>
obstinate	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. The <b>obstinate</b> problem of unemployment.
patience	The capacity to accept or tolerate delay, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious. You can find bargains if you have the <b>patience</b> to sift through the rubbish.
perseverance	Persistent determination. His <b>perseverance</b> with the technique illustrates his single mindedness.
persevere	Continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty or with little or no indication of success. <i>His family persevered with his treatment.</i>
persistence	Persistent determination. Cardiff s <b>persistence</b> was rewarded with a try.
pertinacity	Persistent determination.
reliant	Dependent on someone or something. The company is heavily <b>reliant</b> on the baby market.
<u>rely</u>	Have confidence or faith in. I know I can <b>rely</b> on your discretion.



resourcefulness	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. A man of great <b>resourcefulness</b> .
<u>tenacity</u>	The quality or fact of continuing to exist; persistence. You have to admire the <b>tenacity</b> of these two guys.
trust	An organization or company managed by trustees. <i>He can be <b>trust</b>ed to carry out an impartial investigation.</i>
uncritical	Not critical; not tending to find or call attention to errors. An <b>uncritical</b> acceptance of the results.
<u>vigilance</u>	The action or state of keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties. Security duties that demand long hours of <b>vigilance</b> .
<u>viscosity</u>	The state of being thick, sticky, and semi-fluid in consistency, due to internal friction. <i>Cooling the fluid raises its viscosity</i> .
willing	Not brought about by coercion or force. A <b>willing</b> participant.
