enthusiasm	Something that arouses enthusiasm. Few expressed <b>enthusiasm</b> about the current leaders.
excitement	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>His face was flushed with</i> <b>excitement</b> <i>and his hands trembled</i> .
<u>exhilaration</u>	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.

fondness	Affection or liking for someone or something. <i>He had a <b>fondness</b> for whiskey.</i>
<u>glee</u>	A song for men's voices in three or more parts, usually unaccompanied, of a type popular especially c.1750–1830. <i>His face lit up with impish glee</i> .
gratification	A source of pleasure. Dull repetitious work gives no <b>gratification</b> .
<u>gusto</u>	Vigorous and enthusiastic enjoyment. He had a particular <b>gusto</b> for those sort of performances.
happiness	State of well-being characterized by emotions ranging from contentment to intense joy. She struggled to find <b>happiness</b> in her life.
liking	A feeling of pleasure and enjoyment. Mrs Parsons had a <b>liking</b> for gin and tonic.
nip	A small sharp bite or snip. A strong beak which can deliver a serious <b>nip</b> .
pleasure	An activity that affords enjoyment. <i>He was tingling with <b>pleasure</b></i> .
rapture	A state of elated bliss. Listening to sweet music in a perfect <b>rapture</b> .
sapidity	The taste experience when a savoury condiment is taken into the mouth.
