- conduct** Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction.

- convey** Transfer to another.

fetch	Inflict (a blow or slap) on (someone). <i>That air of his always fetches women.</i>
lift	Take without referencing from someone else's writing or speech; of intellectual property. <i>The end of September is the time to lift and store carrots.</i>
move	Cause to move or shift into a new position or place both in a concrete and in an abstract sense. <i>She deftly moved the conversation to safer territory.</i>
pass on	Be superior or better than some standard.
relay	Control or operate by relay. <i>Please relay the news to the villagers.</i>
remove	Remove something concrete as by lifting pushing or taking off or remove something abstract. <i>He sat down and quickly removed his shoes and socks.</i>
resettle	Settle or cause to settle in a different place. <i>The immigrants had to resettle.</i>
send	Send a message or letter. <i>It s the spectacle and music that send us not the words.</i>
shift	Make a shift in or exchange of. <i>He shifted a little in his chair.</i>
take	Of a plant or seed take root or begin to grow germinate. <i>Take steps.</i>
transplant	Be transplantable. <i>These delicate plants do not transplant easily.</i>
transport	Transport commercially. <i>The bulk of freight traffic was transported by lorry.</i>
uproot	Destroy completely, as if down to the roots. <i>My father travelled constantly and uprooted his family several times.</i>



Usage Examples of "Relocate" as a verb

- *Distribution staff will be relocated to Holland.*
- *Our company relocated to the Midwest.*
- *Sixty workers could face redundancy because the firm is relocating.*
- *We had to relocate the office because the rent was too high.*

alteration	An event that occurs when something passes from one state or phase to another. <i>Alterations had to be made.</i>
change	Exchange something with someone else giving one thing and receiving something of the same kind in return. <i>I paid with a twenty and pocketed the change.</i>
consignor	The person who delivers over or commits merchandise.
convey	Make (an idea, impression, or feeling) known or understandable. <i>It s impossible to convey how lost I felt.</i>
conveyance	The legal process of transferring property from one owner to another. <i>A role that demands much more than the conveyance of simple emotions.</i>
currently	At this time or period; now. <i>The EC is currently attempting greater economic integration.</i>
emerging	Coming to maturity. <i>Established and emerging artists.</i>
headquarters	Plural a military unit consisting of a commander and the headquarters staff. <i>Many companies have their headquarters in New York.</i>
lever	A flat metal tumbler in a lever lock. <i>Rich countries use foreign aid as a lever to promote political pluralism.</i>
metamorphose	(of an insect or amphibian) undergo metamorphosis, especially into the adult form. <i>Overnight family houses metamorphose into bed and breakfast as 7 000 visitors roll into town.</i>
move	Have a turn make one s move in a game. <i>His family moved the Special Court for adequate maintenance expenses to run the household.</i>
mover	A company that moves the possessions of a family or business from one site to another. <i>Job movers.</i>
newly	Again; afresh. <i>Newly raised objections.</i>
reassign	Allocate or distribute (work or resources) differently. <i>He had been reassigned to another post.</i>
revision	A revised edition or form of something. <i>It would require a drastic revision of his opinion.</i>
shift	Make a shift in or exchange of. <i>Grimm showed how the consonants shifted.</i>

shifting	Continuously varying. <i>His constant shifting disrupted the class.</i>
tack	Fasten with tacks. <i>He tacked together some verses.</i>
transfer	A small coloured picture or design on paper which can be transferred to another surface by being pressed or heated. <i>A transferred use of the Old English noun.</i>
transfigure	Elevate or idealize, in allusion to Christ's transfiguration. <i>The treatment and diet transfigured her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
transformation	A process by which one figure, expression, or function is converted into another one of similar value. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
<u>transmit</u>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>The programme was transmitted on 7 October.</i>
transmogrify	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
transmutation	The changing of one element into another by radioactive decay, nuclear bombardment, or similar processes. <i>The transmutation of base metals into gold proved to be impossible.</i>
transport	Transport commercially. <i>The book transported her to new worlds.</i>
transportation	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>Transportation on the site includes a monorail.</i>
underway	Currently in progress. <i>Preparations for the trial are underway.</i>
<u>unused</u>	Not in active use. <i>An unused envelope.</i>
