- Have faith or confidence in.






# Synonyms of "Rely" as a verb (19 Words)

bank	Put into a bank account. The track was <b>bank</b> ed to allow a train to take curves faster while maintaining passenger comfort.
<u>bargain</u>	Negotiate the terms and conditions of a transaction. We <b>bargain</b> ed for a beautiful rug in the bazaar.
be contingent	Be identical or equivalent to.
be dependent	Happen, occur, take place.
bet	Maintain with or as if with a bet. I would be prepared to <b>bet</b> that he wanted to leave.
<u>calculate</u>	Predict in advance. The program can <b>calculate</b> the number of words that will fit in the space available.
<u>count</u>	Include as if by counting. Can you <b>count</b> the books on your shelf.



depend	Be grammatically dependent on. His tongue <b>depend</b> ed from open jaws.
hang	Kill by hanging. The murderer was <b>hang</b> ed on Friday.
hinge	Attach with a hinge. The ironing board was set into the wall and <b>hinge</b> d at the bottom.
<u>lean</u>	Cause to lean or incline. She <b>lean</b> ed over the banister.
look	Look forward to the probable occurrence of. <i>He just didn t <b>look</b> himself at all.</i>
<u>pivot</u>	Turn on a pivot. The government s reaction <b>pivot</b> ed on the response of the Prime Minister.
place reliance	Estimate.
plan	Make or work out a plan for devise. She had <b>plan</b> ned the garden from scratch.
reckon	Have faith or confidence in. His debts were <b>reckon</b> ed at 300 000.
<u>rest</u>	Give a rest to. I m going to <b>rest</b> up before travelling to England.
swear	Utter obscenities or profanities. He forced them to <b>swear</b> an oath of loyalty to him.
turn	To break and turn over earth especially with a plow. <i>The pedophile <b>turn</b>ed to boys for satisfaction.</i>

# Associations of "Rely" (30 Words)

<u>beholden</u>	Owing thanks or having a duty to someone in return for help or a service. <i>I don t like to be <b>beholden</b> to anybody.</i>
belief	Any cognitive content held as true. A <b>belief</b> in democratic politics.
<u>believable</u>	(of a fictional character or situation) convincing or realistic. A drama that lacks <b>believable</b> characters.
believe	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>He didn t <b>believe</b> her.</i>
centrality	The state of being accessible from a variety of places. The <b>centrality</b> and sovereignty of the state.
<u>confidant</u>	Someone to whom private matters are confided. A close <b>confidant</b> e of the princess.



confiding	Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>She was in a <b>confiding</b> mood.</i>
credibility	The quality of being believable or trustworthy. The book s anecdotes have scant regard for <b>credibility</b> .
<u>credible</u>	Credulous. A <b>credible</b> witness.
credit	Give someone credit for something. A student can earn one unit of academic <b>credit</b> .
<u>credulity</u>	Tendency to believe readily. Moneylenders prey upon their <b>credulity</b> and inexperience.
credulous	Having or showing too great a readiness to believe things. A ceremony staged for <b>credulous</b> tourists.
depend	Be grammatically dependent on. A town which had <b>depend</b> ed heavily upon the wool industry.
<u>dependence</u>	Addiction to drink or drugs. Japan s <b>dependence</b> on imported oil.
dependent	Addicted to a drug. A clause <b>dependent</b> on another clause.
entirely	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (`whole' is often used informally for `wholly. <i>We have an <b>entirely</b> different outlook.</i>
<u>faith</u>	An institution to express belief in a divine power. <i>They broke <b>faith</b> with their investors.</i>
<u>faithful</u>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. The city has always been <b>faithful</b> to the Conservative party.
<u>gullible</u>	Easily tricked because of being too trusting. At that early age she had been <b>gullible</b> and in love.
<u>heavily</u>	In a manner designed for heavy duty. <i>It was raining <b>heavily</b>.</i>
<u>interdependent</u>	(of two or more people or things) dependent on each other. We in Europe are all increasingly <b>interdependent</b> .
<u>recourse</u>	Act of turning to for assistance. <i>Have <b>recourse</b> to the courts.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. A <b>reliable</b> source of information.



<u>reliance</u>	The state of relying on something. He wrote the paper with considerable <b>reliance</b> on the work of other scientists.
reliant	Relying on another for support. The company is heavily <b>reliant</b> on the baby market.
trust	Confer a trust upon. I should never have <b>trust</b> ed her.
<u>trusted</u>	Regarded as reliable or truthful. A sure or <b>trusted</b> friend.
trustful	Having or marked by a total belief in the reliability, truth, or ability of someone. Great brown eye true and <b>trustful</b> .
trusting	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust- Nordhoff & Hall. A shy and <b>trusting</b> child.
<u>trustworthy</u>	Worthy of trust or belief. <b>Trustworthy</b> public servants.
