- *Recall the past.*



## Synonyms of "Reminisce" as a verb (12 Words)

<b>be nostalgic about</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>call to mind</b>	Demand payment of (a loan.
<b>cast one's mind back to</b>	Throw forcefully.
<b>hark back to</b>	Be in back of.
<b>look back on</b>	Search or seek.
<b>recall</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>The ambassador was <b>recalled</b> to his country.</i>
<b>recollect</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite <b>recollect</b> the reason.</i>
<b>reflect on</b>	Give evidence of a certain behavior.
<b>remember</b>	Mention as by way of greeting or to indicate friendship. <i>I <b>remember</b> the screech of the horn as the car came towards me.</i>

**remember with pleasure** Mention favorably, as in prayer.

**review** Hold a review of troops.  
*All slides were then **reviewed** by one pathologist.*

**think back to** Have or formulate in the mind.



## Usage Examples of "Reminisce" as a verb

- *They reminisced about their summers abroad.*



## Associations of "Reminisce" (30 Words)

- anecdote** An account regarded as unreliable or hearsay.  
*He told **anecdotes** about his job.*
- boyhood** The state or time of being a boy.  
*He has been passionate about cars since **boyhood**.*
- catchy** (of a tune or phrase) instantly appealing and memorable.  
*A **catchy** title for a movie.*
- conjure** Ask for or request earnestly.  
*He **conjured** wild birds in the air.*
- evocative** Serving to bring to mind.  
*The building's cramped interiors are highly **evocative** of past centuries.*
- evoke** Evoke or provoke to appear or occur.  
***Evoke** sympathy.*

<b>fallibility</b>	The likelihood of making errors. <i>Studies on the <b>fallibility</b> of memory and perception.</i>
<b>implore</b>	Beg earnestly for. <i>He <b>implored</b> her to change her mind.</i>
<b>meditate</b>	Plan mentally; consider. <i>I set aside time every day to write and <b>meditate</b>.</i>
<b>memoir</b>	The proceedings of a learned society. <i>In 1924 she published a short <b>memoir</b> of her husband.</i>
<b>memory</b>	An electronic memory device. <i>The brain regions responsible for <b>memory</b>.</i>
<b>mindful</b>	Focusing one's awareness on the present moment, especially as part of a therapeutic or meditative technique. <i>A <b>mindful</b> approach to life helps us to let go of the stress that often comes with conflicts in relationships.</i>
<b>nostalgic</b>	A nostalgic person. <i>He remained <b>nostalgic</b> about the good old days.</i>
<b>psyche</b>	The human soul, mind, or spirit. <i>How does constant losing affect the <b>psyches</b> of young athletes.</i>
<b>reawaken</b>	Awaken once again. <i>A sense of community started to <b>reawaken</b> in the 1970s.</i>
<b>recall</b>	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>The Panamanian ambassador was <b>recalled</b> from Peru.</i>
<b>recollect</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite <b>recollect</b> the reason.</i>
<b>recollection</b>	The ability to recall past occurrences. <i>A biography based on his wife s <b>recollections</b>.</i>
<b>redolent</b>	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>Names <b>redolent</b> of history and tradition.</i>
<b>remember</b>	Pray for the well-being of. <i>No one <b>remembered</b> his name.</i>
<b>remembrance</b>	The action of remembering the dead. <i>I went through the papers and <b>remembrances</b> in his drawers.</i>
<b>remind</b>	Put in the mind of someone. <i>His impassive fierce stare <b>reminded</b> her of an owl.</i>
<b>reminder</b>	A letter sent to remind someone of an obligation, especially to pay a bill. <i>Her mushroom omelette is a blissful <b>reminder</b> of Sunday suppers.</i>

<b>reminiscence</b>	The process of remembering (especially the process of recovering information by mental effort. <i>His story made me smile in <b>reminiscence</b>.</i>
<b>reminiscent</b>	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>Her robes were vaguely <b>reminiscent</b> of military dress.</i>
<b>retention</b>	The power of retaining and recalling past experience. <i>The soil's <b>retention</b> of moisture.</i>
<b>retentive</b>	Having the power, capacity, or quality of retaining water. <i>A <b>retentive</b> mind.</i>
<b>retrospect</b>	Look back upon (a period of time, sequence of events); remember. <i>A full <b>retrospect</b> of the battle.</i>
<b>think</b>	An act of thinking. <i>She didn't <b>think</b> to harm me.</i>
<b>ividly</b>	In a vivid manner. <i><b>Vividly</b> coloured paintings.</i>
