call to mind	Demand payment of (a loan.
cast one's mind back to	Throw forcefully.
hark back to	Be in back of.
look back on	Search or seek.
recall	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>The ambassador was recalled to his country.</i>
recollect	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite recollect the reason.</i>
reflect on	Give evidence of a certain behavior.
remember	Mention as by way of greeting or to indicate friendship. <i>I remember the screech of the horn as the car came towards me.</i>

remember with pleasure Mention favorably, as in prayer.

review Hold a review of troops.
*All slides were then **reviewed** by one pathologist.*

think back to Have or formulate in the mind.

- anecdote** An account regarded as unreliable or hearsay.
*He told **anecdotes** about his job.*
- boyhood** The state or time of being a boy.
*He has been passionate about cars since **boyhood**.*
- catchy** (of a tune or phrase) instantly appealing and memorable.
*A **catchy** title for a movie.*
- conjure** Ask for or request earnestly.
*He **conjured** wild birds in the air.*
- evocative** Serving to bring to mind.
*The building's cramped interiors are highly **evocative** of past centuries.*
- evoke** Evoke or provoke to appear or occur.
***Evoke** sympathy.*

fallibility	The likelihood of making errors. <i>Studies on the fallibility of memory and perception.</i>
implore	Beg earnestly for. <i>He implored her to change her mind.</i>
meditate	Plan mentally; consider. <i>I set aside time every day to write and meditate.</i>
memoir	The proceedings of a learned society. <i>In 1924 she published a short memoir of her husband.</i>
memory	An electronic memory device. <i>The brain regions responsible for memory.</i>
mindful	Focusing one's awareness on the present moment, especially as part of a therapeutic or meditative technique. <i>A mindful approach to life helps us to let go of the stress that often comes with conflicts in relationships.</i>
nostalgic	A nostalgic person. <i>He remained nostalgic about the good old days.</i>
psyche	The human soul, mind, or spirit. <i>How does constant losing affect the psyches of young athletes.</i>
reawaken	Awaken once again. <i>A sense of community started to reawaken in the 1970s.</i>
recall	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>The Panamanian ambassador was recalled from Peru.</i>
recollect	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite recollect the reason.</i>
recollection	The ability to recall past occurrences. <i>A biography based on his wife s recollections.</i>
redolent	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>Names redolent of history and tradition.</i>
remember	Pray for the well-being of. <i>No one remembered his name.</i>
remembrance	The action of remembering the dead. <i>I went through the papers and remembrances in his drawers.</i>
remind	Put in the mind of someone. <i>His impassive fierce stare reminded her of an owl.</i>
reminder	A letter sent to remind someone of an obligation, especially to pay a bill. <i>Her mushroom omelette is a blissful reminder of Sunday suppers.</i>

reminiscence	The process of remembering (especially the process of recovering information by mental effort). <i>His story made me smile in reminiscence.</i>
reminiscent	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>Her robes were vaguely reminiscent of military dress.</i>
retention	The power of retaining and recalling past experience. <i>The soil's retention of moisture.</i>
retentive	Having the power, capacity, or quality of retaining water. <i>A retentive mind.</i>
retrospect	Look back upon (a period of time, sequence of events); remember. <i>A full retrospect of the battle.</i>
think	An act of thinking. <i>She didn't think to harm me.</i>
ividly	In a vivid manner. <i>Vividly coloured paintings.</i>
