**comparable with** Conforming in every respect.

**evocative** Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson.  
*The building's cramped interiors are highly **evocative** of past centuries.*

**inviting comparison with** Attractive and tempting.

**redolent** Having a strong pleasant odor.  
*The hall was **redolent** of floor wax.*

**remindful** Acting as a reminder.  
*His humour is **remindful** of that of Max.*

**resonant** (of a place) filled or resounding with (a sound).  
*The **resonant** reds greens and browns typical of Ribera's palette.*

Expressing closely related meanings.



### **Usage Examples of "Reminiscent" as an adjective**

- *Her expression was wistful and reminiscent.*
- *The sights were reminiscent of my childhood.*
- *Her robes were vaguely reminiscent of military dress.*

<b><u>aromatic</u></b>	An aromatic compound. <i>A massage with <b>aromatic</b> oils.</i>
<b>aware</b>	Having or showing knowledge or understanding or realization or perception. <i>Most people are <b>aware</b> of the dangers of sunbathing.</i>
<b>boyhood</b>	The state or time of being a boy. <i>A <b>boyhood</b> friend.</i>
<b>catchy</b>	Likely to attract attention. <i>A <b>catchy</b> question.</i>
<b><u>conjure</u></b>	Call (an image) to the mind. <i>A special tune that <b>conjures</b> up a particular time and place.</i>

<b><u>evocative</u></b>	Serving to bring to mind. <i>The building's cramped interiors are highly <b>evocative</b> of past centuries.</i>
<b><u>evoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Akasha is <b>evoked</b> in India when a house is being built to ensure its completion.</i>
<b>fragrant</b>	Pleasant-smelling. <i>She gathered the <b>fragrant</b> blooms.</i>
<b>implore</b>	Beg someone earnestly or desperately to do something. <i>He <b>implored</b> her to change her mind.</i>
<b>memoir</b>	The proceedings of a learned society. <i>In 1924 she published a short <b>memoir</b> of her husband.</i>
<b>memory</b>	An electronic memory device. <i>A <b>memory</b> and the CPU form the central part of a computer to which peripherals are attached.</i>
<b><u>mindful</u></b>	Bearing in mind; attentive to. <i>The judge said that he was not <b>mindful</b> to postpone the eviction again.</i>
<b><u>nostalgic</u></b>	A nostalgic person. <i>A <b>nostalgic</b> account of an idyllic childhood.</i>
<b>odoriferous</b>	Morally offensive. <i><b>Odoriferous</b> spices.</i>
<b>reawaken</b>	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>His departure <b>reawakened</b> deep divisions within the party.</i>
<b>recall</b>	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>People's understanding and subsequent <b>recall</b> of stories or events.</i>
<b>recollect</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite <b>recollect</b> the reason.</i>
<b><u>recollection</u></b>	Something recalled to the mind. <i>To the best of my <b>recollection</b> no one ever had a bad word to say about him.</i>
<b>redolent</b>	Fragrant or sweet-smelling. <i>A rich inky <b>redolent</b> wine.</i>
<b>remember</b>	Pray for the well-being of. <i>Do you <b>remember</b> that he once loved you.</i>
<b>remembrance</b>	A memory or recollection. <i>I went through the papers and <b>remembrances</b> in his drawers.</i>

<b>remind</b>	Cause someone to think of (something) because of a resemblance. <i>You had an accident he <b>reminded</b> her.</i>
<b>reminder</b>	An experience that causes you to remember something. <i>One man was threatened with court action for not paying his water rates when he did not receive a <b>reminder</b>.</i>
<u><b>reminisce</b></u>	Indulge in enjoyable recollection of past events. <i>They <b>reminisced</b> about their summers abroad.</i>
<b>reminiscence</b>	A story told about a past event remembered by the narrator. <i>His first works are too full of <b>reminiscences</b> of earlier poetry.</i>
<u><b>resonant</b></u>	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>The sound of these instruments played in a <b>resonant</b> room is unforgettable.</i>
<b>retentive</b>	Serving to keep something in place. <i>Soil should be rich and moisture <b>retentive</b>.</i>
<u><b>suggestive</b></u>	Tending to suggest an idea. <i>Artifacts <b>suggestive</b> of an ancient society.</i>
<b>vividly</b>	In a way that produces powerful feelings or strong, clear images in the mind. <i>I am <b>vividly</b> aware of the need for good journalism.</i>
