anecdote	Short account of an incident (especially a biographical one). <i>His wife s death has long been the subject of rumour and anecdote.</i>
boyhood	The state or time of being a boy. <i>He has been passionate about cars since boyhood.</i>
catchy	Likely to attract attention. <i>Catchy pop melodies.</i>
conjure	Call (an image) to the mind. <i>She conjured him to return.</i>
evocative	Bringing strong images, memories, or feelings to mind. <i>The building s cramped interiors are highly evocative of past centuries.</i>
evoke	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>The Green Paper evoked critical reactions from various bodies.</i>
fallibility	The tendency to make mistakes or be wrong. <i>Studies on the fallibility of memory and perception.</i>
implore	Call upon in supplication; entreat. <i>I implore mercy.</i>
meditate	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I set aside time every day to write and meditate.</i>
memoir	An account of the author’s personal experiences. <i>A revealing passage from Khrushchev s memoirs.</i>
memory	An electronic memory device. <i>He had a good memory when he was younger.</i>
mindful	Bearing in mind; attentive to. <i>The judge said that he was not mindful to postpone the eviction again.</i>
nostalgic	A nostalgic person. <i>He remained nostalgic about the good old days.</i>

psyche	A beautiful princess loved by Cupid who visited her at night and told her she must not try to see him; became the personification of the soul. <i>Their childhood made them want to understand the human psyche and to help others.</i>
reawaken	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>A sense of community started to reawaken in the 1970s.</i>
recall	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>The recall of our ambassador.</i>
recollect	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite recollect the reason.</i>
recollection	Something recalled to the mind. <i>To the best of my recollection no one ever had a bad word to say about him.</i>
redolent	Strongly smelling of. <i>A campaign redolent of machine politics.</i>
remember	Bear (someone) in mind by making them a gift or making provision for them. <i>We remembered the 50th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz.</i>
remembrance	A recognition of meritorious service. <i>I went through the papers and remembrances in his drawers.</i>
remind	Cause (someone) to remember someone or something. <i>You had an accident he reminded her.</i>
reminder	A letter sent to remind someone of an obligation, especially to pay a bill. <i>He ignored his wife s reminders.</i>
reminiscence	A characteristic of one thing that is suggestive of another. <i>His first works are too full of reminiscences of earlier poetry.</i>
reminiscent	Absorbed in or suggesting absorption in memories. <i>The sights were reminiscent of my childhood.</i>
retention	The act of retaining something. <i>The children s retention of facts.</i>
retentive	Serving to keep something in place. <i>Soils retentive of moisture.</i>
retrospect	Look back upon (a period of time, sequence of events); remember. <i>A full retrospect of the battle.</i>
think	An instance of deliberate thinking. <i>I need to give it a good think.</i>
