<u>anecdote</u>	Short account of an incident (especially a biographical one. His wife s death has long been the subject of rumour and <b>anecdote</b> .
boyhood	The state or time of being a boy. <i>He has been passionate about cars since</i> <b>boyhood</b> .
catchy	Likely to attract attention. <i>Catchy</i> pop melodies.
<u>conjure</u>	Call (an image) to the mind. She <b>conjure</b> d him to return.
<u>evocative</u>	Bringing strong images, memories, or feelings to mind. The building s cramped interiors are highly <b>evocative</b> of past centuries.
<u>evoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. The Green Paper <b>evoke</b> d critical reactions from various bodies.
fallibility	The tendency to make mistakes or be wrong. Studies on the <b>fallibility</b> of memory and perception.
implore	Call upon in supplication; entreat. I <b>implore</b> mercy.
<u>meditate</u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. I set aside time every day to write and <b>meditate</b> .
memoir	An account of the author's personal experiences. A revealing passage from Khrushchev s <b>memoir</b> s.
memory	An electronic memory device. He had a good <b>memory</b> when he was younger.
<u>mindful</u>	Bearing in mind; attentive to. <i>The judge said that he was not <b>mindful</b> to postpone the eviction again.</i>
<u>nostalgic</u>	A nostalgic person. He remained <b>nostalgic</b> about the good old days.



<u>psyche</u>	A beautiful princess loved by Cupid who visited her at night and told her she must not try to see him; became the personification of the soul. <i>Their childhood made them want to understand the human</i> <b>psyche</b> <i>and to</i> <i>help others.</i>
reawaken	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. A sense of community started to <b>reawaken</b> in the 1970s.
recall	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>The <b>recall</b> of our ambassador.</i>
recollect	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite <b>recollect</b> the reason.</i>
recollection	Something recalled to the mind. To the best of my <b>recollection</b> no one ever had a bad word to say about him.
redolent	Strongly smelling of. A campaign <b>redolent</b> of machine politics.
remember	Bear (someone) in mind by making them a gift or making provision for them. We <b>remember</b> ed the 50th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz.
remembrance	A recognition of meritorious service. I went through the papers and <b>remembrance</b> s in his drawers.
remind	Cause (someone) to remember someone or something. You had an accident he <b>remind</b> ed her.
reminder	A letter sent to remind someone of an obligation, especially to pay a bill. <i>He ignored his wife s <b>reminder</b>s.</i>
reminiscence	A characteristic of one thing that is suggestive of another. <i>His first works are too full of <b>reminiscence</b>s of earlier poetry.</i>
<u>reminiscent</u>	Absorbed in or suggesting absorption in memories. The sights were <b>reminiscent</b> of my childhood.
<u>retention</u>	The act of retaining something. The children s <b>retention</b> of facts.
retentive	Serving to keep something in place. Soils <b>retentive</b> of moisture.
<u>retrospect</u>	Look back upon (a period of time, sequence of events); remember. A full <b>retrospect</b> of the battle.
think	An instance of deliberate thinking. I need to give it a good <b>think</b> .
