Showing lack of care for consequences. irresponsible Behaved like an irresponsible idiot.

Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. lackadaisical

She was annoyingly **lackadaisical** and impractical.

Of a speech sound especially a vowel pronounced with the vocal muscles

relaxed. <u>lax</u>

Such **lax** and slipshod ways are no longer acceptable.

Failing in what duty requires. neglectful

You are being **neglectful** of our guests.

Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern.

negligent **Negligent** parents.

(of business or trade) characterized by a lack of work or activity; quiet. slack

Slack tides.

(of shoes) worn down at the heel. slipshod

Slipshod spelling.

Showing lack of careful thought. thoughtless

The debate turned into **thoughtless** bickering.

Marked by or paying little heed or attention-Franklin D. Roosevelt. unheeding

Mary **unheeding** watched the television.

Not mindful or attentive. unmindful

Danielle seemed **unmindful** of her parents plight.

Expressed, done, or acting without proper consideration of the

unthinking consequences.

She was at pains to correct **unthinking** prejudices.

Failure to attend to one's responsibilities; negligence.

A moment of **inattention** which could have cost lives.

inattentive Not showing due care or attention.

I was disappointed by the food and the **inattentive** service.

Pronounced with muscles of the tongue and jaw relatively relaxed e g the

lax vowel sound in bet.

lenient

Lax security arrangements at the airport.

Unwilling to work or use energy.

They were enjoying a really **lazy** holiday.

Tolerant or lenient.

Lenient rules.

A tendency to limp a gait impeded by injury or stiffness.

The conversation **limp**ed on for half an hour.

Make something loose untie or undo.

The lorry s trailer came **loose**.

neglectful Not showing due care or attention.

Neglectful parents.



negligent Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern.

Negligent in his correspondence.

oblivious (followed by `to' or `of') lacking conscious awareness of.

Oblivious old age.

permissiveness A disposition to allow freedom of choice and behavior.

A new age of sexual **permissiveness**.

regardless In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks.

He carried on **regardless** of the difficulties.

reprehensible Deserving censure or condemnation.

His complacency and **reprehensible** laxity.

slack Decrease or reduce in intensity, quantity, or speed.

Slack lime.

slapdash In a careless or reckless manner.

Slapdash work.

sloppy Lacking neatness or order.

Sloppy workmanship.

tolerant Tolerant and forgiving under provocation.

Fault **tolerant** computer systems.

unconcerned Lacking in interest or care or feeling.

Readers **unconcerned** with style.

unmindful Not mindful or attentive- G.B.Shaw.

While thus **unmindful** of his steps he stumbled.
