Synonyms of "Remiss" as an adjective (17 Words)

<u>careless</u>	Without due thought or consideration. <i>Careless proofreading.</i>
<u>delinquent</u>	Failing in what duty requires. A delinquent account.
<u>derelict</u>	Failing in what duty requires. Derelict or delinquent in his duty.
forgetful	Apt or likely not to remember. She was soon forgetful of the time.
heedless	Characterized by careless unconcern- Edith Wharton. <i>Heedless</i> of danger.
inattentive	Not showing due care or attention. An inattentive babysitter.



<u>irresponsible</u>	Showing lack of care for consequences. Behaved like an irresponsible idiot.
<u>lackadaisical</u>	Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. She was annoyingly lackadaisical and impractical.
<u>lax</u>	Of a speech sound especially a vowel pronounced with the vocal muscles relaxed. Such lax and slipshod ways are no longer acceptable.
neglectful	Failing in what duty requires. You are being neglectful of our guests.
negligent	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern. <i>Negligent parents.</i>
slack	(of business or trade) characterized by a lack of work or activity; quiet. <i>Slack tides.</i>
slipshod	(of shoes) worn down at the heel. <i>Slipshod</i> spelling.
<u>thoughtless</u>	Showing lack of careful thought. The debate turned into thoughtless bickering.
unheeding	Marked by or paying little heed or attention-Franklin D. Roosevelt. Mary unheeding watched the television.
unmindful	Not mindful or attentive. Danielle seemed unmindful of her parents plight.
unthinking	Expressed, done, or acting without proper consideration of the consequences. She was at pains to correct unthinking prejudices.

- Remiss of you not to pay your bills.
- It would be very remiss of me not to pass on that information.

absentminded	Lost in thought; showing preoccupation. An absentminded professor.
baggy	(of eyes) with folds of puffy skin below them. <i>His eyes were</i> baggy with the fatigue of overwork.
<u>boot</u>	Kick give a boot to. A boot disk.



<u>careless</u>	Marked by lack of attention or consideration or forethought or thoroughness; not careful. <i>Careless</i> proofreading.
carelessness	The quality of not being careful or taking pains. Most road accidents are caused by carelessness on the part of motorists.
distrait	Distracted or absent-minded. <i>He seemed oddly distrait.</i>
floppy	A flexible removable magnetic disk (typically encased in a hard plastic shell) for storing data. A spaniel with floppy ears.
forgetful	Not mindful or attentive. I m a bit forgetful these days.
<u>hat</u>	Headdress that protects the head from bad weather has shaped crown and usually a brim. <i>He was unsuitably</i> hat <i>ted</i> .
heedless	Characterized by careless unconcern. <i>Heedless</i> of the child s crying.
inadvertent	Happening by chance or unexpectedly or unintentionally. An inadvertent administrative error occurred that resulted in an overpayment.
inattention	Failure to attend to one's responsibilities; negligence. A moment of inattention which could have cost lives.
inattentive	Not showing due care or attention. I was disappointed by the food and the inattentive service.
<u>lax</u>	Pronounced with muscles of the tongue and jaw relatively relaxed e g the vowel sound in bet. <i>Lax security arrangements at the airport.</i>
<u>lazy</u>	Unwilling to work or use energy. They were enjoying a really lazy holiday.
<u>lenient</u>	Tolerant or lenient. <i>Lenient</i> rules.
<u>limp</u>	A tendency to limp a gait impeded by injury or stiffness. The conversation limp ed on for half an hour.
loose	Make something loose untie or undo. <i>The lorry s trailer came loose</i> .
neglectful	Not showing due care or attention. <i>Neglectful</i> parents.



negligent	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern.
	Negligent in his correspondence.
<u>oblivious</u>	(followed by `to' or `of') lacking conscious awareness of. <i>Oblivious</i> old age.
permissiveness	A disposition to allow freedom of choice and behavior. A new age of sexual permissiveness .
<u>regardless</u>	In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks. <i>He carried on regardless of the difficulties.</i>
<u>reprehensible</u>	Deserving censure or condemnation. <i>His complacency and reprehensible laxity.</i>
slack	Decrease or reduce in intensity, quantity, or speed. Slack lime.
slapdash	In a careless or reckless manner. <i>Slapdash</i> work.
<u>sloppy</u>	Lacking neatness or order. <i>Sloppy</i> workmanship.
<u>tolerant</u>	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. Fault tolerant computer systems.
unconcerned	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>Readers</i> unconcerned with style.
unmindful	Not mindful or attentive- G.B.Shaw. While thus unmindful of his steps he stumbled.
