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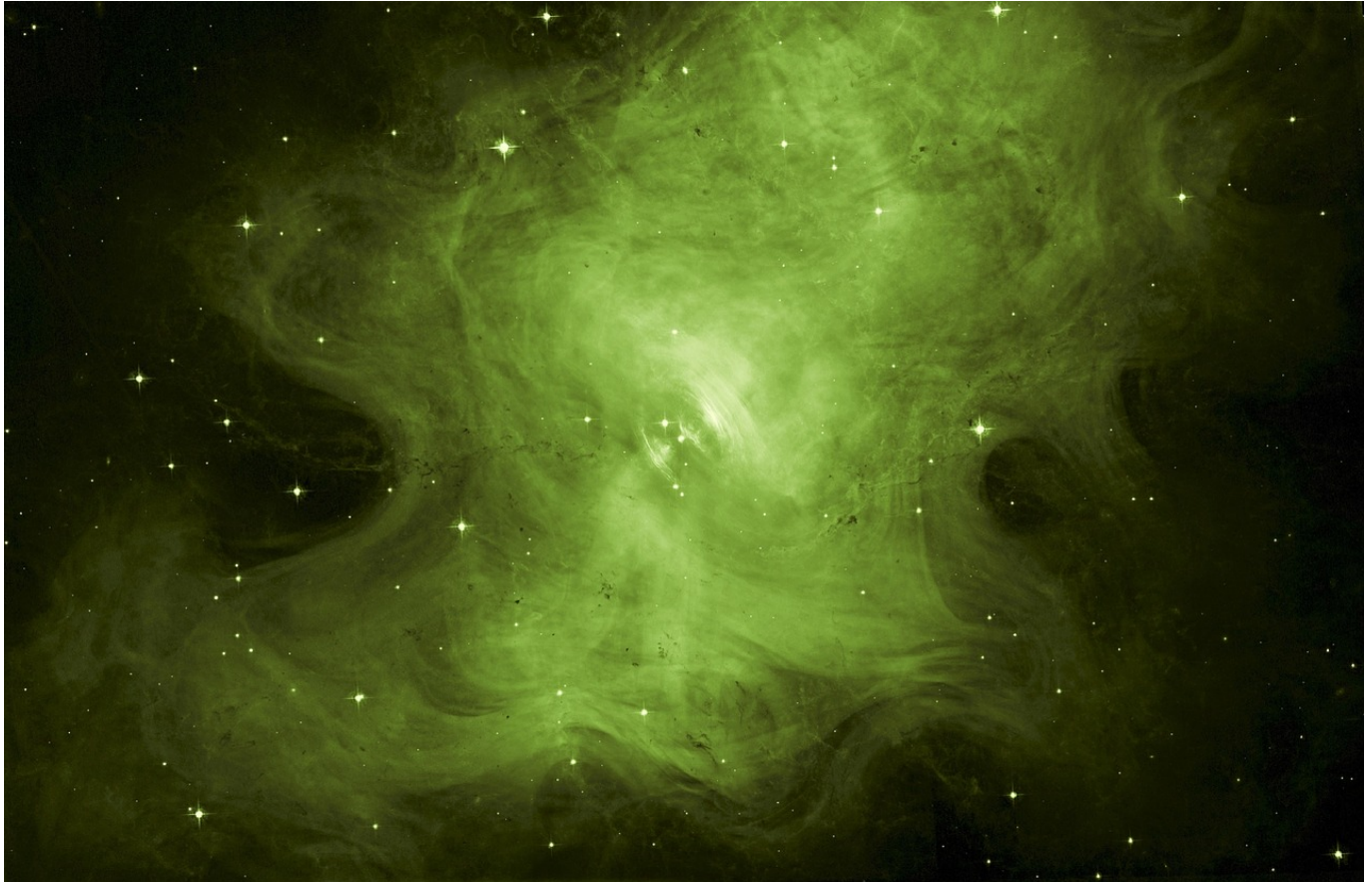

Remnant as a Noun

Definitions of "Remnant" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “remnant” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A small minority of people who will remain faithful to God and so be saved (in allusion to biblical prophecies concerning Israel).*
- *A part or quantity that is left after the greater part has been used, removed, or destroyed.*
- *A piece of cloth left when the greater part has been used or sold.*
- *A small part or portion that remains after the main part no longer exists.*
- *A surviving trace.*
- *A piece of cloth that is left over after the rest has been used or sold.*



Synonyms of "Remnant" as a noun (15 Words)

bit	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>All they had left was a bit of bread.</i>
end	Football the person who plays at one end of the line of scrimmage. <i>You will go to church and there s an end of it.</i>
fragment	A broken piece of a brittle artifact. <i>A fragment of rock.</i>
leavings	Things that have been left as worthless. <i>She dropped her lunch leavings into a bin.</i>
leftover	Something, especially food, remaining after the rest has been used. <i>He s just a leftover from another age.</i>
leftovers	A small part or portion that remains after the main part no longer exists. <i>He had leftovers for dinner last night.</i>

- oddment** Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting.
*A quilt made from **oddments** of silk.*
- offcut** A piece of waste material that is left behind after cutting a larger piece.
*A timber **offcut**.*
- piece** A separate part of a whole.
*A chess **piece**.*
- remainder** The number that remains after subtraction; the number that when added to the subtrahend gives the minuend.
*23 divided by 3 is 7 **remainder** 2.*
- remains** Any object that is left unused or still extant.
*The **remains** of a sandwich lunch were on the table.*
- residue** A small amount of something that remains after the main part has gone or been taken or used.
*The ash was a **residue** from coal fired power stations.*
- rest** An instance or period of resting.
*The gun was steadied on a special **rest**.*
- scrap** A small piece of something that is left over after the rest has been used.
*Every **scrap** of green land is up for grabs by development.*
- shred** A tiny or scarcely detectable amount.
*We have not a **shred** of evidence to go on.*



Usage Examples of "Remnant" as a noun

- *The bogs are an endangered remnant of a primeval landscape.*
- *If any one ceases to be a witness, he ceases to be one of the remnant.*
- *He sat sewing patchwork cushions with all the remnants.*
- *A remnant of the past.*



Associations of "Remnant" (30 Words)

- debris** Loose natural material consisting especially of broken pieces of rock.

<u>equity</u>	The difference between the market value of a property and the claims held against it. <i>Equity of treatment.</i>
flotsam	The wreckage of a ship or its cargo found floating on or washed up by the sea. <i>The room was cleared of boxes and other flotsam.</i>
fossil	Characteristic of a fossil. <i>Sites rich in fossils.</i>
impartiality	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
impurity	A trace element deliberately added to a semiconductor; a dopant. <i>A struggle to rid the soul of sin and impurity.</i>
left	On or to the left side. <i>She looked left and right.</i>
leftover	A small part or portion that remains after the main part no longer exists. <i>He s just a leftover from another age.</i>
neutrality	PH value of 7. <i>The structure has overall electrical neutrality.</i>
other	Very unusual; different in character or quality from the normal or expected. <i>Hearing was good in his other ear.</i>
remainder	Sell cheaply as remainders. <i>Titles are being remaindered increasingly quickly to save on overheads.</i>
<u>remaining</u>	Not used up. <i>England have forbidden him to play in the remaining fixtures.</i>
remains	A relic that has been excavated from the soil. <i>Roman remains.</i>
<u>residual</u>	A portion of rocky or high ground remaining after erosion. <i>The withdrawal of residual occupying forces.</i>
<u>residue</u>	The part of an estate that is left after the payment of charges, debts, and bequests. <i>The residue of the country s colonial past.</i>
<u>rest</u>	Not move be in a resting position. <i>Rest assured.</i>
riffraff	Disparaging terms for the common people.

rubble	Waste or rough fragments of stone, brick, concrete, etc., especially as the debris from the demolition of buildings. <i>The tower is built of stone rubble faced with ashlar.</i>
<u>scavenge</u>	(of an animal) search for (carrion) as food. <i>Solid lead deposits of combustion would be scavenged from the engine.</i>
<u>survivor</u>	One who outlives another. <i>He left his farm to his survivors.</i>
<u>trace</u>	Discover traces of. <i>Police are trying to trace a white van seen in the area.</i>
unclaimed	Not claimed or called for by an owner or assignee. <i>Unclaimed benefits.</i>
vestige	The smallest amount. <i>He waited patiently but without a vestige of sympathy.</i>
vestigial	Not fully developed in mature animals. <i>The vestigial wings of kiwis are entirely hidden.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>The wastefulness of missed opportunities.</i>
wreckage	The remaining parts of something that has been wrecked. <i>Firemen had to cut him free from the wreckage of the car.</i>
